My DEAR PARISHIONERS AND FRIENDS.

The past has many lessons for us, and in the year before us let us remember God's message for the future (Micah. vi. 8). "He hath shewed thee O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of Thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God,"

Every one will regret losing Mr. W. A. Hodges from amongst us, and will unite in wishing him many years of health and happiness. He has been to all a good friend and a good neighbour during his thirteen years residence in East Bridgford.

CHURCH FINANCE.—At a Parochial Church Council Meeting held on Monday, December 19th, 1921, a report from a Sub-Committee appointed to consider a Free-will Offering Scheme for the provision of funds for meeting the expenses of Church maintenance was received. The matter was given very full consideration, and the Council unanimously decided to adopt the following plan—

1. That the present plan of a weekly collection in Church for Church

Expenses be not altered.

That in addition to this source of income, envelopes should be sent to church people who are willing to make use of them, with a request that they should be used for the purpose of sending in contrbutions to the Church maintenance fund.

- That the envelopes be sent in to the Rector or the Churchwardens, or be deposited in a box to be provided for the purpose in Church. This may be done quarterly, half-yearly, or annually, as preferred by those who are willing to join in this scheme.
- 4. That a Register of the amounts shall be kept, but no names published; and an acknowledgement of the totals received be made.

It is proposed to begin this plan during the present quarter, so that contributions may be made by the end of March. In this way it is hoped that those who are unable to attend services may find an opportunity of making contributions, according to their means, and their conscience, and that many will see the advantage of making regular contributions during the year, instead of leaving it to the Churchwardens, or requiring a special appeal to defray the necessary expenses, at the end of the year. The Church Accounts will now be made up to December 31st, instead of to Easter, as heretofore.





LENT, 1922.—The season of Lent will have begun before this Magazine is in its readers' hands. Ash Wednesday falls on March 1st; Easter Even on April 15th. Perhaps for many amongst us such times seem to have a less insistent call than in former years; there are so many things going on now; there seems nothing attractive in any observance of Lent.

The fact is that this generation is still affected by the years of strain and anxiety of War-Time. On the one hand the rapidity and vastness of events during those years, so engrossing, and yet so far outside our own control, has produced a certain heedlessness and reluctance towards thoughtfulness; and on the other hand there has come into our lives a reaction, in a keen desire for constant change and fresh excitement, and reluctance towards quietude. And what is even more serious, a younger generation is growing up in this atmosphere of heedlessness and excitement among those a little older than themselves, and it seems to them that it is normal, and nothing else matters in the life before them.

No one ought to wish to condemn the things that tend to brighten life for old or young, or to check opportunities for enjoyment of all our faculties; but as we grow older we should learn that there is beauty and refreshment and hope to be found in other ways than in the excitement of the moment.

Thought and quiet have their use. They are necessary for the development of our spiritual nature, as rest and sleep are for our body. Times of thought and quiet are required for the growth of personal religion and it is the great purpose of Lent to help us keep these before the mind for a short time by definite intention and effort even in the busiest life.

During this Lent I have arranged with the Rev. H. Lovell Clarke, M.A., Vicar of All Saints', Nottingham, for a course of addresses which he has kindly undertaken to give on Friday evenings at 7 o'clock, on "Personal Religion," as follows: and I earnestly hope that this course will be appreciated and well attended.



FREE-WILL OFFERINGS.—The small envelopes have now been distributed with an explanatory letter. Two envelopes have been included, one intended for the present quarter, and one for the quarter ending with June. A further supply will be provided for those who wish to make use of them. A box is ready inside the Church to receive the envelopes, at the contributor's convenience. Let it be remembered that this plan of contribution to the expenses of keeping the church clean, warmed and lighted is suggested for those who are willing to make use of it. As its name implies, it is pressed on no one, some who do not attend often may still be willing to contribute, and they are asked to make use of this plan. The Churchwardens should be able to depend on a fund which is not affected by weather and irregular attendance at Church. "Let every man do according as he is disposed in his heart, not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

A Self-Denial Week.—The Bishop has made an earnest appeal for a week of Prayer and self-denial, as a united effort of the Diocese to make a special Lenten offering to God on behalf of the work which needs support. If everyone who recognizes the value of that work will try to make some saving by an act of self-denial for one week in order to make a contribution in response, a considerable sum would be rai-ed. An opportunity is given in this Church during the week April 1-8, by using blue envelopes supplied for the purpose. These are quite distinct from our own free-will offering envelopes, but may be placed in the same box.

WE have a very sad occurrence to place on record in our magazine this month, which has affected the whole village most deeply, and called out the sincerest sympathy with the family on whom so terrible a blow has fallen. At about 12 o'clock on the morning of Sunday, Sept. 17th, some 33 feet of the wall on Kirkhill, bounding Mr. Claye's land along the Newton road, suddenly fell across the footpath, crushing beneath it three children, who were returning home from a walk. The two younger children of Mr. Edwin Fox, Alice May, aged 10 and Walter Edwin Norman, aged 6, were killed by the falling bricks, and their cousin, Joseph Gilbert from Car Colston, aged 9, received severe internal injury. He was taken to the Nottingham Hospital and is we hope doing well. No one was actually present at the moment, but Miss Cuthbert heard the noise and saw the cloud of dust, and discovered the children underneath the bricks. Some of the choir boys just out of Church were sent off for the Doctor and Police constable, and many willing helpers were soon on the spot. The wall has been for some years out of the perpendicular and since last winter has certainly seemed more dangerous, but its movement has been so imperceptible that nothing seemed imminent. The roots of a tree had gradually thrust it up. There was only a very slight breeze from the South at the time. The inquest on the two victims of the accident was held on the following day; and the funeral took place on Wednesday, September 20th, in the presence of a very large number of friends. Wreaths were sent, among many others, by the children of East Bridgford School where Alice and Walter were scholars.

By the death of Mr. Harry Forrest, at his house in West Bridgford on Sept. 12th, many in East Bridgford have lost a much trusted friend. For many years, he was confidental clerk to Mr. Harry Wyles, of Nottingham, and while he lived among us here he was always ready to help his neighbours with his business knowledge, and set a good example of a Christian life. He was buried in the Churchyard on Sept. 15th, after a service in the Primitive Methodist Chapel.



Our Harvest Thanksgivings were heartily offered in Church on Sunday, Oct. 15th, and at Evensong, the Church was crowded to its utmost capacity. An Anthem was sung "Thou visitest the earth," Ps. lxv. 9, 12 (Green), and the collections were given to the Sunday School Fund, £5 0s. 12d.

The new Cassocks and Surplices were used by the Choir for the first time at the services on Oct. 15th, and not before they were needed, for the old ones have seen long service and were completely worn out. The cost has been large, but the Church Council was determined that the materials should be of the best. We are glad to say that they have been paid for, £57 4s. 6d., though the whole of the amount has not yet been contributed to the fund, which requires a word of explanation. For two years past we have been collecting for a special Surplice fund; and the Free-will offering scheme for Church maintenance, which was begun last year, has also been very well supported. Those who have sent in their quarterly contributions will be glad to know that it has been appreciated and now forms a very reliable and useful means of relieving the Churchwardens from the anxiety they often had in making ends meet. All is paid into the Church funds in the Churchwardens' hands, and so they were able to pay for the surplices at once. But to do this they had to draw upon the balance they were holding to pay salaries, coal bills, etc., which fall due at the end of the year. The Church accounts now have to be closed on December 31st, and it will therefore be necessary to raise an amount of about £20 by that date.

A special collection will be asked for on the second Sunday in November (Nov. 12th) and the Church Council earnestly appeal to everyone to contribute either at that time, or in the quarterly Freewill offering envelopes before the end of the year, so that the whole expenses may be met.

We must not think only of our own Parochial needs. Our outlook must be widened so as to realize that much of the Church's work has to be carried out in the organization of the Diocese, and some of it by a Central Church fund. The maintenance of the Clergy, for instance, is mainly a Diocesan matter, the training of the Clergy is very largely a central matter. The money required in both cases must come either through Parochial Church Councils or by individual gifts. Last May we were called upon to contribute our share, £5 15s. 4d. to Diocesan Funds, and on Oct. 29th, the contribution from this parish to the Central Church fund, of £5 2s. 8d. was asked for.

This year special attention was called to the training of 1700 ex-service men, who have offered themselves for ordination, and it is a duty we owe to them to provide the training of those who cannot afford it themselves.

These annual requests for proportionate contributions from every parish should be carefully attended to, for they enable the whole work of the Church to be carried on.



But Advent has more to teach us. No one can think seriously about his belief in Christ without fully facing a belief in the future Coming of Christ in glory. And there are two ways of understanding this. Does it mean on the one hand that what we are to look for is a gradual up-building of the Kingdom of God on earth by the transformation of individual characters and human institutions so that it is a new earth? Or does it mean that we are to look forward to an ending of this world and the perfecting of man's hopes in a quite different world called Heaven? This is the question often asked; which is true? The right answer is that both may be gathered from Our Lord's teaching. One does not exclude the other; they are not alternatives. But our Christian Religion is to teach us how to live in this world, and our work is to labour for the establishment of the Kingdom of God here and now. Neither Christ's teaching nor our own experience warrants us in thinking that the power of evil will be finally extinguished in the present world-order, but we are taught to pray "Thy Kingdom come in earth as it is in heaven."
