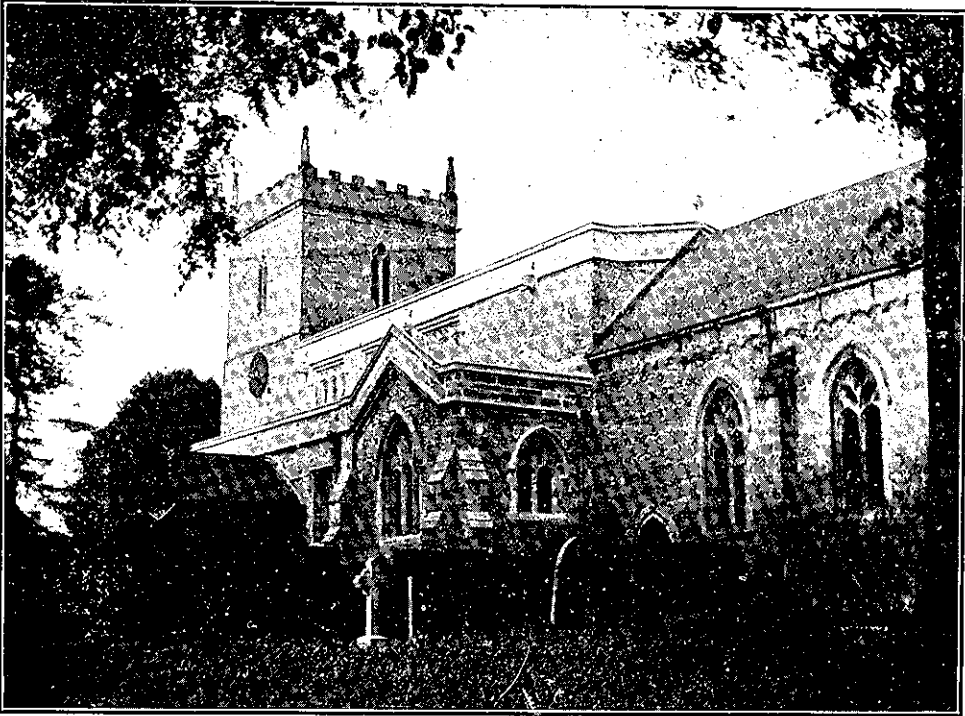

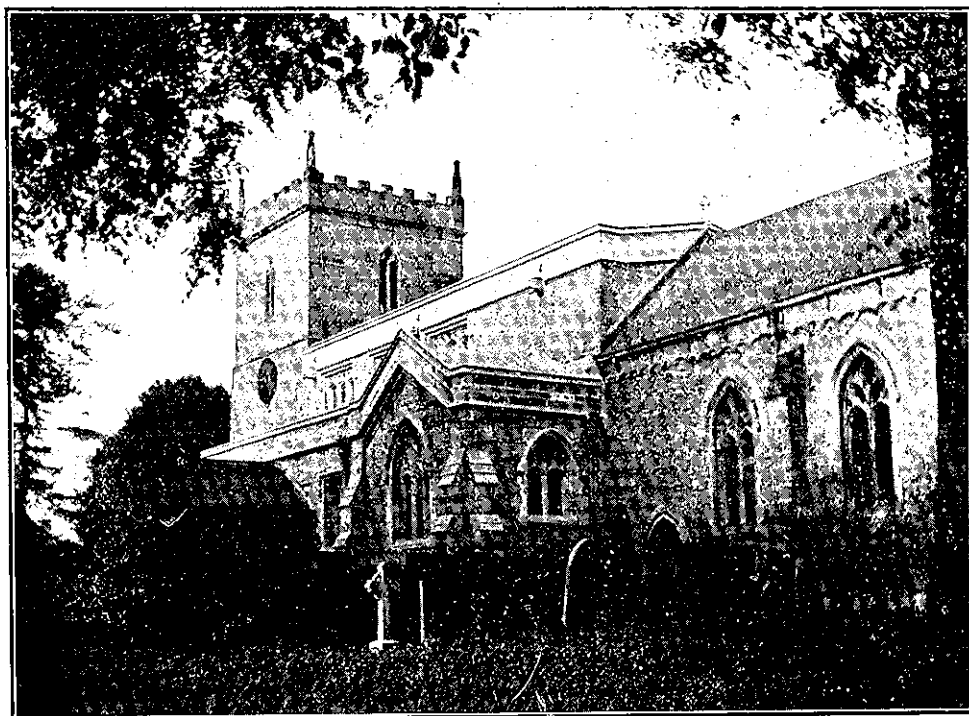

THE ANNUAL CHURCH PAROCHIAL MEETING was summoned for Jan. 29th instead of in Easter Week, for the presentation of the Church Accounts for 1923, and the appointment of the Church Council for the ensuing year. This change is made in consequence of the revised rules of the Church National Assembly for the representation of the Laity; Church Accounts are now made up to December 31st instead of to Easter; the Church Council is annually elected to serve for the current year.

Parish representatives are appointed at this Meeting triennially to the Deanery Conference, which in turn selects its representatives to attend the Diocesan Conference. The Lay members of this body then choose a certain number (depending on the total numbers on the Electoral Rolls) as representatives of the Diocese in the House of Laymen, who together with the Bishops and representatives of the Clergy, form the National Assembly of the Church of England. This body therefore fully represents the Church. It has the ungrudging and unpaid assistance of some of the wisest and most far-seeing church men and women, and has statutory power to promote measures of finance, reform and settlement of questions of the day. It is clearly the duty of every churchman to help the whole system at its foundations in his own parish, by seeing that his name is recorded on the Electoral Roll, and by attending the Church meeting of his own parish.

The result of the Parochial Church Meeting, and the Church Accounts, will be given in March.

THE PARISH COUNCIL has arranged to collect periodically and dispose of old tins, broken crockery, etc. We hope therefore that parishioners will retain these things until such times as they can be collected, instead of throwing them out to the disfigurement of the lanes.

ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION. The monthly meeting was held on Jan. 19th for election of new members, and especially for the completion of the list of orders for seed potatoes, which was finally arranged and sent off. The next meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on Monday, February 11th.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE. The monthly meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 12th. Lecture on "Care of the teeth" by Mr Searby. Exhibition and sale of supper dishes. Competition—Early bulbs.

Among various parochial gatherings that belong to this season, we may record a successful tea party on January 3rd for the Sunday School children, and the entertainment of the Ringers and Choir at the Rectory. The annual Social Evening of the members of the Mothers' Union was held at the Rectory on January 16th.

An excellent concert, arranged by Major R. H. Swain, J.P., with the help of talented Nottingham friends, on behalf of the funds of our Boys' Brigade, was held January 24th.

The Treasurer of the British Legion has furnished an account of the very gratifying results of the collection and whist drive, etc., which was organised on November 22nd last, for the benefit of their ex-service comrade, Charles Ellis, who health has so completely broken down. After defraying expenses, a sum of £23 14s. 7d. was handed to him by the British Legion.

We are thankful that Mrs Reuben Morris has recovered from her alarming accident, which but for prompt assistance might have had very serious results. A cistern 9ft deep is not a pleasant experience.

EAST BRIDGFORD MAGAZINE. The total cost of printing the 175 monthly Magazines for 1923 amounts to £19 10s. This works out at a little less than 2½d. for each Magazine, or for the yearly 12 numbers exactly 2s. 2½d., so that the sale at 2d. does not defray the cost. The Rector however believes that the Magazine is always welcomed, and that it saves other necessary printing: but he gladly acknowledges some extra subscriptions that have helped towards the deficiency which is of annual occurrence.

Mr. R. K. Beaumont, Churchwarden, then presented the Church Accounts for 1923, showing a balance in hand of £24 9s. 10½d.

The Chairman gave a report of the work of the Church Council during the past year, and referred to the loss sustained by the death of Mr. Dent, Parish Clerk, to whose memory the Church Council has erected a tombstone, of Miss M. Sharp, Organist, and of Mr. G. Cartwright, Churchwarden.

The Meeting was then adjourned for the purpose of receiving the Electoral Roll, revised. The adjourned meeting will take place on Easter Tuesday, April 22nd, immediately after the Annual Vestry Meeting which is held at 7 p.m.

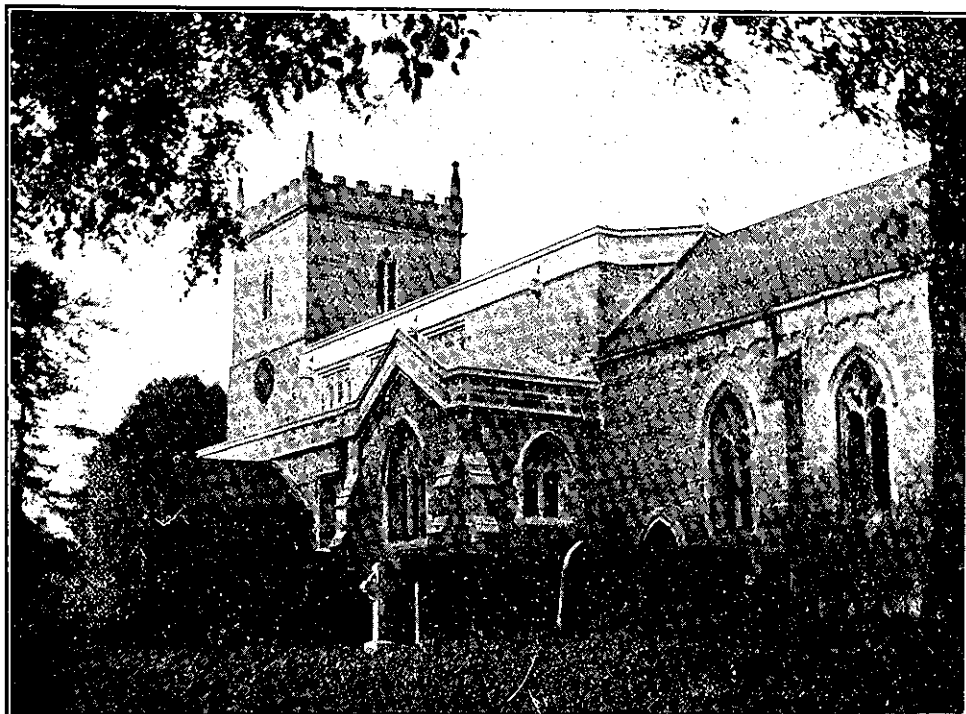

This month brings us to the last fortnight of Lent, leading us on from the lessons of penitence and self-discipline of the earlier weeks, to the contemplation of the Death and Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ. So it prepares us for Easter, the greatest Christian festival of the Resurrection. In the words of our Prayer Book, inviting us to the Easter Communion,—“wherefore it is our duty to render most humble and hearty thanks to Almighty God, our heavenly Father for that He hath given his Son our Saviour Jesus Christ, not only to die for us, but also to be our spiritual food and sustenance in that holy Sacrament.”

In Holy Week there will be Mattins and Evensong at 10.30 and 7, with a celebration of Holy Communion on Thursday Morning; on Good Friday, April 18th, the Services will be at 11 and 7.30; and on Easter Day, April 20th, celebrations of Holy Communion at 7 a.m., 8 a.m. and after Mattins at Midday.

The Easter Vestry Meeting for the appointment of Churchwardens will be held at 7 p.m. in the School on April 22nd, Tuesday in Easter Week. Immediately afterwards the adjourned Parochial Church Meeting will take place for the purpose of receiving the revised Electoral Roll.

MAGDALEN COLLEGE, OXFORD.—The College of St. Mary Magdalen originated in a community founded 1448, by William of Waynflete, Bishop of Winchester, and one of the famous pioneers of education in England. In 1480 the Charter was granted, and the President, Fellows and Scholars of the Society entered the now completed buildings of their new College, which stands on the east side of the City of Oxford, with its beautiful Chapel and peaceful Cloisters, crowned by the fine Bell Tower which was completed in 1505, nineteen years after the death of the venerable founder, and which is the glory not only of the College but of Oxford.

The connection between our parish and the College arose in the following way. At the beginning of the 14th century the principal Manor of East Bridgford was shared between two co-heiresses who married respectively Sir John de Caltoft (whose effigy lies in the Church) and Sir John de Multon. One portion, that of Multon, in the course of time descended to the family of Deyncourt. In 1468 John Deyncourt decided to bestow his East Bridgford property upon his friend William of Waynflete, Bishop of Winchester, for the benefit of his new College at Oxford. After some difficulties with his other heirs and relatives at his death, the Deyncourt property in East Bridgford in 1480 became a part of the endowment of that noble institution for the spreading of education and for the daily worship of God, which we have so long been accustomed to speak of familiarly as “The College.”

And now the President, Fellows, and Scholars have decided to sell some of their widely separated properties, and the 650 acres of their East Bridgford Estate will be offered for sale by auction on April 3rd. We regret the disturbance of long tenancies thus caused, and the severance of the bond which has united us for four-and-a-half centuries and has given a certain dignity to this village; and we shall lose a good landlord.

CRICKET CLUB.—The Committee of the East Bridgford Cricket Club wish to thank all who by their services and gifts of refreshments helped to provide the Social Evening held on February 27th last. The amount realized was £6 10s.

ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION.—The final meeting of the season will take place on Monday, April 14th, at 7 p.m., when the accounts for potatoes should be settled up, and Lady Day rents are due. The Committee have made a venture, and are glad to report that they have been able to purchase the Fossfield 18-acre allotment ground, of which they have hitherto been tenants, by negotiation with Magdalen College.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE.—At the meeting on Tuesday, April 8th, a Lecture on “First Aid” by Nurse Pike, is announced.

Miss Henrietta Swanwick, who is compelled by ill-health to leave East Bridgford and to dispose of her business, desires to express through the Magazine her thanks to her friends for their many kindnesses, as she is unable to do so personally.

EAST BRIDGFORD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.—The annual meeting of members of this Society was held on March 4th. The officers were elected as follows: *President*, Rev A. D. Hill; *Treasurer*, Mr R. H. Swain; *Secretary*, Mr A. H. Smith, with Mr E. W. Millington as *Assistant Secretary*. A Committee of 20 was appointed.

The balance sheet was presented, showing a balance in hand of £44 18s.

The programme for the next Show, on Tuesday, July 1st, was discussed. It was decided to drop the open classes of last year and to offer two gold medals for the highest number of prizes in classes B and C. Poultry classes are to be added to the schedule, some of which are to be open. Two classes for Rabbits reared by residents of the village will be arranged; and three prizes are offered for the best cultivated allotments, from 500 yards to 1 rood. 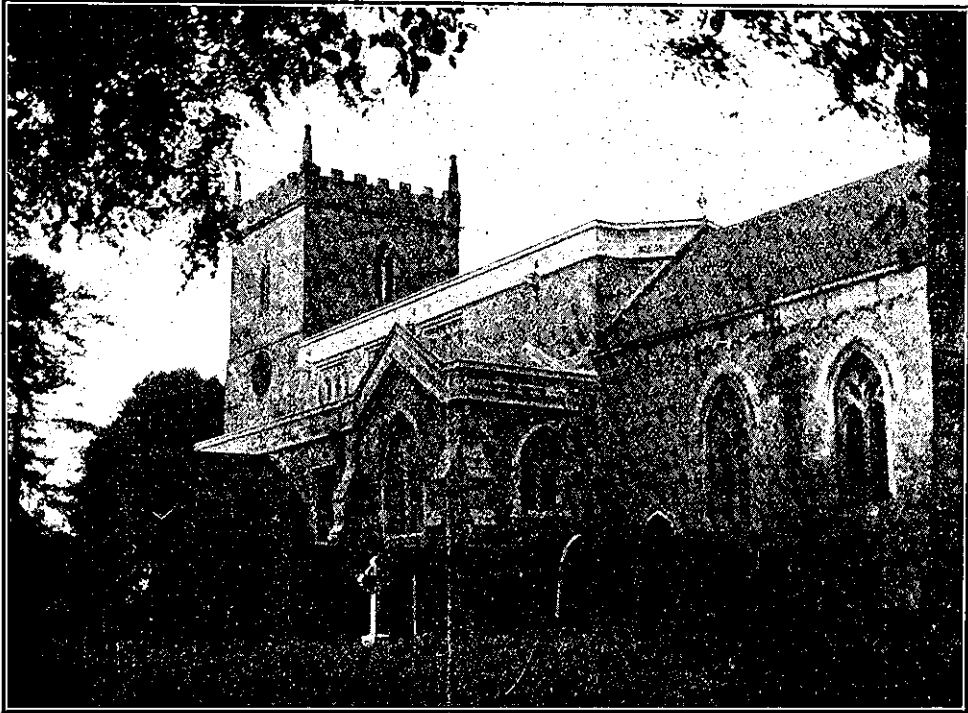

At the Easter Vestry Meeting, held on Tuesday in Easter week at 7 p.m., Mr. F. S. Molyneux and Mr. R. K. Beaumont were nominated as Church wardens for the coming year by the Rector and parishioners respectively.

The adjourned Parochial Church Meeting was held afterwards, for the formal presentation of the Church Electoral Roll which has been revised and completed.

Easter day with joy was bright, and the Church bells ushered in a warm spring morning for our high Festival. The Rector was assisted by Rev. C. Rogerson, and good congregations filled the Church at all Services.

THE SCHOOL.—The Rector, on behalf of the Managers of the School, asks for some additional subscriptions this year. The asphalt which was laid down in 1921 was much broken up by the frosts of this long winter, and has been refaced at a cost of £22; minor repairs are always cropping up; we should like to be able to supply a piano which is much more useful for the children's singing than a harmonium. The number on the books is now 135, and we have an excellent and hard working staff of teachers. There ought to be many who would give some extra help to the school, and if they would send their contributions, large or small, to the Rector now, and not wait to be asked individually, it would be a gracious act on their part, and would show their appreciation of the good work that is being done for the children of the parish.

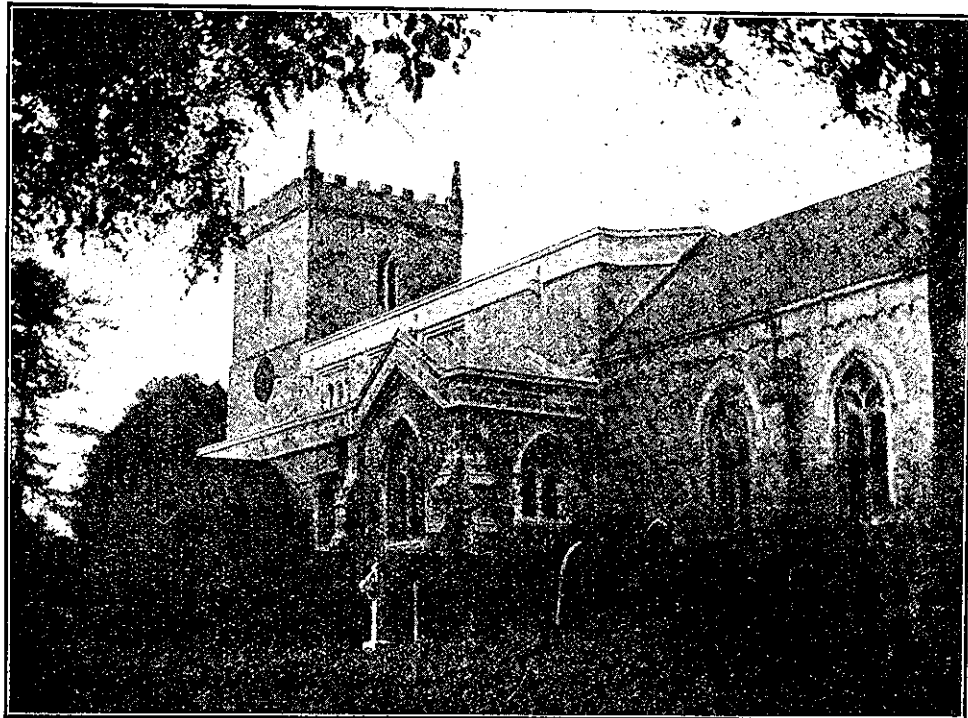

GUNTHORPE BRIDGE.—On May 7th, The Notts County Council gave approval to a scheme for purchasing this bridge from the Gunthorpe Bridge Company, and replacing it by a toll-free new bridge, capable of carrying heavy traffic, at an estimated cost of £125000, subject to the receiving of grants of more than half the cost offered by the Ministry of Transport. The foundation stone of the present bridge, was laid 51 years ago, on May 16th, 1873, as was mentioned in the Magazine last year. It is proposed to build the new bridge 400 yards higher up the river, in line with the Gunthorpe - Lowdham road. Several letters have appeared in the papers, making suggestions of other sites, but Gunthorpe seems to be in the best situation to provide a connecting link between the Foss road and the new road from Nottingham to Bawtry, in the north of the County, through Epperstone and Oxton.

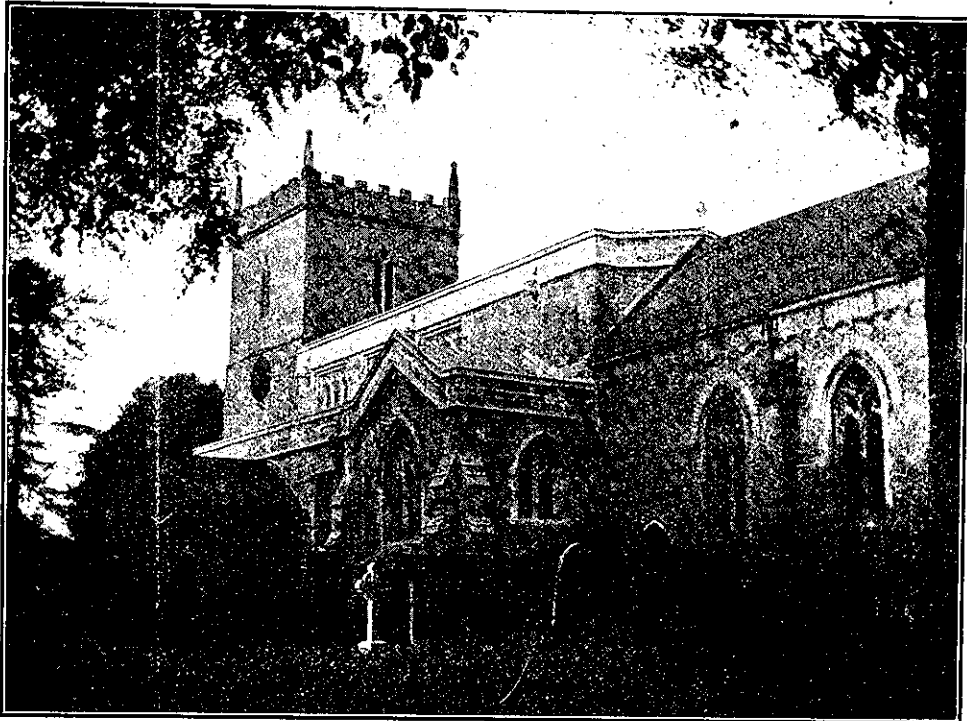

THE ORGAN in Church is in great need of overhauling and repair, which will cost £36. The Church Council have had the matter under consideration and decided that it should be undertaken at once. They therefore ask for contributions before the end of September, and hope for ready support for this important object. It is suggested that the Free-will envelopes may be used for the purpose of sending special contributions for this purpose, during the month when the quarterly gifts are sent in. Contributions may also be placed in the box in church, or sent in to the Church-Wardens.

In order to improve the usefulness of the Organ, a further addition is recommended, which if undertaken at the same time would perhaps cost another £14; but it is thought best to try to accomplish the necessary work only at the present time unless any special support is received for the additional expense.

The organ was erected about 1875 by Wordsworth & Maskell, of Leeds, and originally projected so far into the chancel that no seats stood in front of it. When the chancel was restored it was taken down, and in 1906 an enlarged chamber was prepared for it and the organ was rebuilt in its present position. It is therefore 18 years since any serious overhauling has taken place, which is rather a long time in the life of an organ.

The death of George Wilfred Cox after a short illness was deeply felt by many in East Bridgford. The company of the Boys' Brigade attended the funeral and sounded the Last Post. Mr. and Mrs. J. Cox desire to acknowledge gratefully the wide sympathy which has been shown to them in their bereavement.

Another providential escape, this time from the deep well in Mr. A. Morris' yard which is used by so many, has occurred. Mrs. Young, a new-comer to East Bridgford, fell in as she was drawing water on June 16th, and it was some time before she was extricated, but we are glad to know she is recovering.

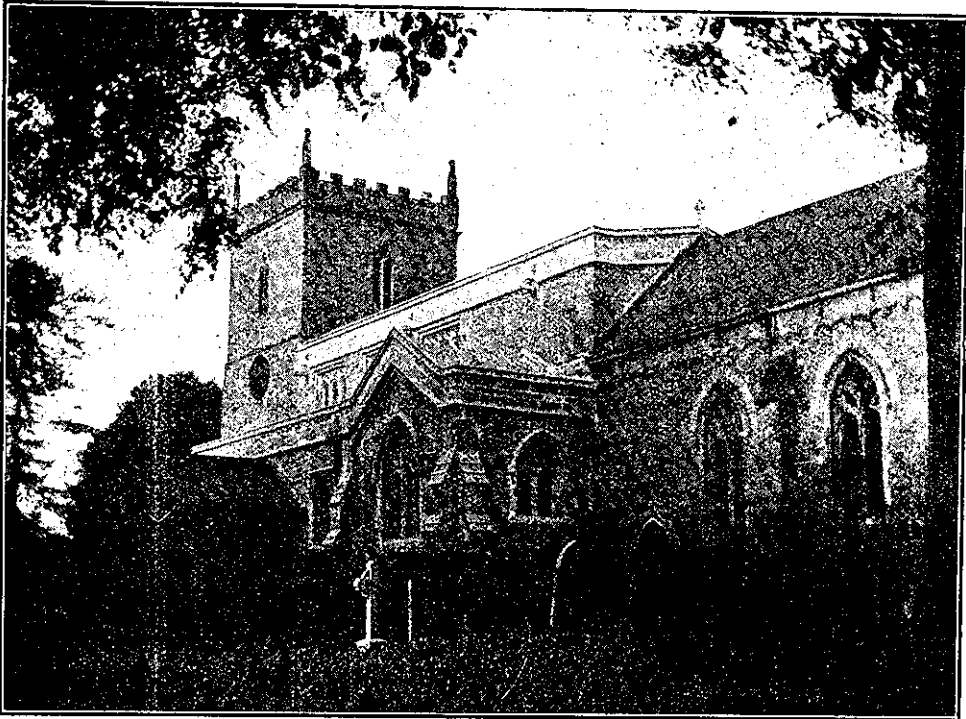

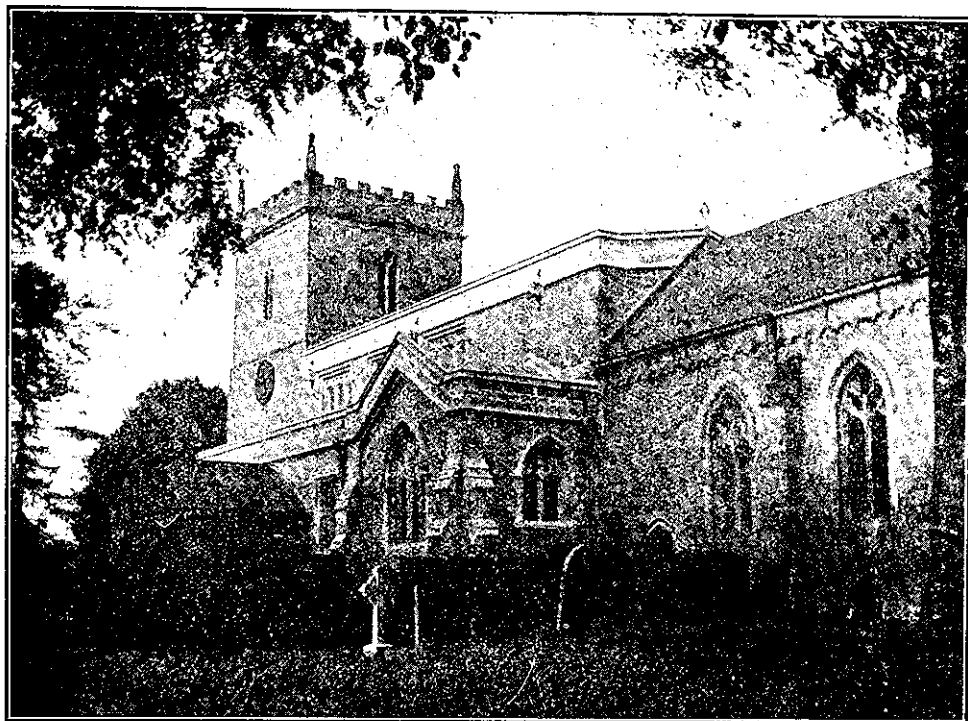

BRIDGFORD OR BRIDGEFORD.—A lurking misgiving may sometimes be felt as to whether we are spelling the name of our village in the right way, and a recent notice issued under the authority of the Postmaster General may have increased this feeling. It says, *The correct postal address of this village is East Bridgeford, Nottingham.* Of course the chief point is that letters addressed to this place should have the post-town "Nottingham," and not "Notts," written upon them, and to this we should conform. It also asserts that we ought to spell our name with an *e* as a distinction from the other Bridgford.

Now the Postmaster-General is no authority upon place-names, and it is no business of his to decide what is "correct" in spelling the name of this village. Is there then a correct spelling? The answer is that with English place-names the generally-accepted spelling is correct. Let us therefore look at the history of the name of this place. The earliest written record is that of the Norman Domesday book in 1086. Two villages are mentioned there with nearly similar names, Brugeford (which is ours) and Brigeford (our overgrown sister 10 miles higher up the river). Both these names may imply a Bridge; but there is no evidence whatever of any bridge here until the present one was built in 1873, while the latter place has had a bridge from Saxon times. A couple of centuries later we find our village distinguished as *estbrigeford*, as recorded on the slab of John de Stanford in the chancel floor (1375). This is by far the prettiest form of the word and it may be regretted that we have lost it. It occurs also as *Estbryggeford* or *Estbriggeford* in records of that period. The other place is sometimes mentioned as *Briggeford ad pontem*,—"at the bridge"; "West" seems to be a much later addition to its name.

At the commencement of our parish registers in 1584, the Rector, Henry Spurre, writes *East Brudford*, and some years later a "d" creeps in, as we write it now, to soften the *g*. John Hull, Rector in 1629 thought it more "correct" to use both *d* and *e*, *Bridgeford*, like the Postmaster. But after his time it has been written in all parochial records, *East Bridgford*, with the exception of a short time at the beginning of the 19th century: On the Church chalice "East Bridgeford 1806" is inscribed.

It is at least doubtful if the name had anything to do with a bridge as we understand it. *Brige* or *bryg*, in addition to the meaning of a bridge, may perhaps be used of a raised causeway leading to the ford, of which traces may still be seen across the Holme meadow, and which was probably necessary for the ancient trackway across the valley on the other side of the river as well. Other instances of this may be found. Or again, it is possible (though we cannot rely much on the vowels of the Norman scribe) that the Domesday *bruge* really indicates some difference of pronunciation, and may represent the Anglo-Saxon word *burh*, a fortified place. We still call the site of Roman Margidunum the "Burrow" or "Boroughfields," and another Foss-way fortified station is known as Brough. The village of East Bridgford lies between the *burh* and the ford.

Anyhow we shall be "correct," in spite of the Postmaster-General, and in company of the people of Bridgnorth and Bridgwater, if we continue to write the name of our village as we have done for the greater part of the last 300 years, East Bridgford.

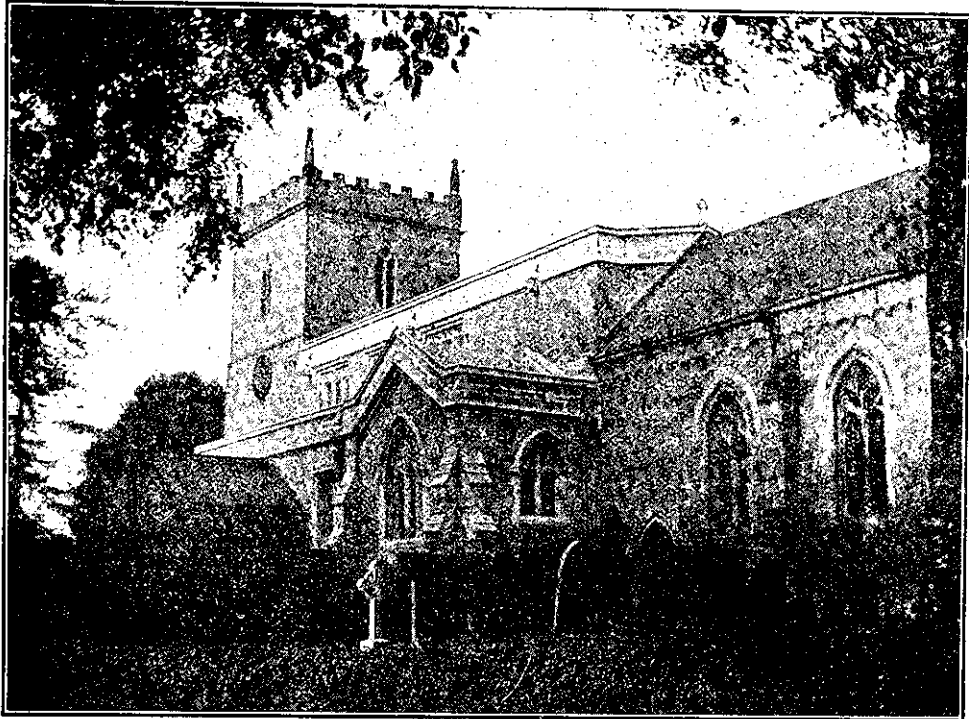

THE ORGAN.—For three Sundays in September, the organ has been silent, having been under repair by Mr. C. F. Lloyd, of Nottingham. Now that we have it in use again, may it help us to offer our sacrifice of praise the better. There are improvements which a musician might reasonably ask to be made in it, but for the present only the absolutely necessary reparations have been made, and an expense of £36 10s. incurred.

THE "PRINCESS MARY" G.F.S. VAN visited East Bridgford on Sept. 10th, attending a short service in Church, and providing an instructive entertainment in the evening.

GUNTHORPE LOCK.—The Trent Navigation Company, in carrying out their great scheme for improving the Water-way between Nottingham and Newark (under the Act of Parliament, 1906) have made great progress with their work at Gunthorpe this year.

The fine new lock, formed of concrete in a straight cutting across a bend of the north bank of the river, is now completed. It is 190 feet in length, 30 feet in breadth, and 20 feet 9 inches in depth. A weir slanting across the river is being constructed of concrete which will have a 5ft cresting of wood. There will be a fish-ladder consisting of an ascending series of pools at the north end, and a slope with rollers for carrying over small boats at the south end.

The water-level below the weir will be three or four feet below the present average height, and above the weir it will be maintained at the level of the lock.

Nothing more has been heard up to the present time of the immense scheme suggested by the County Council, for a new road and bridge across the Trent about a quarter of a mile higher up the river.

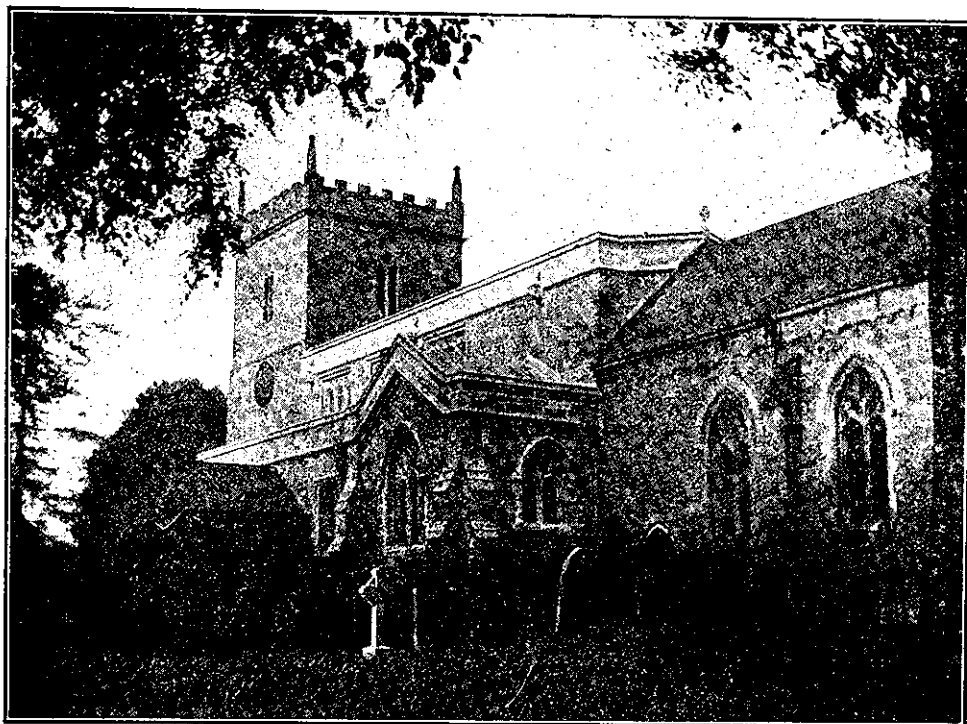

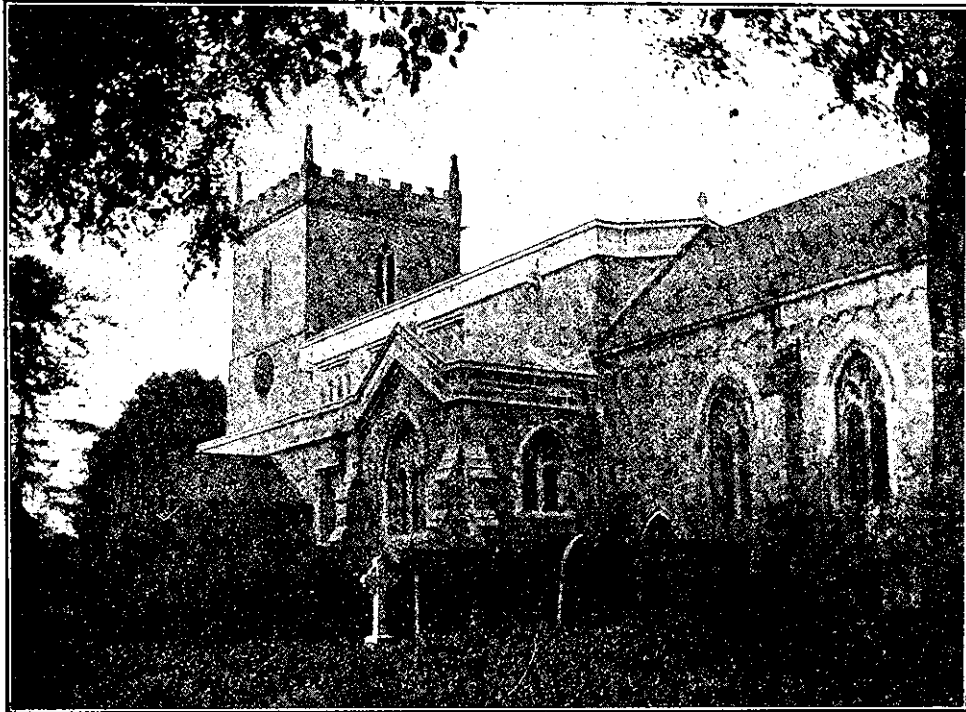

THE DIVISION OF THE DIOCESE. The Diocese of Southwell, consisting of the two counties of Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire, was formed in 1884, to relieve the two over-populated dioceses of Lichfield and Lincoln, to which these counties respectively belonged. The population of the new diocese at that time was roughly 860,000; it has now grown to about 1,360,000, an increase of half a million. There has been for 25 years past an assistant Bishop called the Suffragan Bishop of Derby, provided by voluntary contributions, but experience has shewn that something more than such help is needed for the efficient pastoral oversight of so large a Diocese. The Diocesan Conference resolved to take steps for the formation of a separate Diocese for each county, and after several years of effort the measure for the separation of the two counties has at last been passed and received the Royal Assent on July 14th, becoming thereby an Act of Parliament.

It now remains to provide the capital sum of £80,000 required for the endowment. About £30,000 has already been received or promised, and in the words of our Bishop "We must now bring the appeal and the prayer into every parish and stir up the wills of the whole Church. It is not possible" he says, "for me to do much more for the Diocese, but I shall be happy if I leave behind me two counties with a Scheme accepted and carried through which will make for efficiency in the years to come."

Many parishes have already promised the sums they will raise for this important object. East Bridgford has not done so yet, but it will not be behind other parishes of similar size and ability, and it must be our chief endeavour during the next year to help our Bishop to carry out his great desire.

The Matron of the Hospital, Miss Liddle, kindly came to distribute the prizes. Thanks are due to all who contributed refreshments and prizes and assisted the effort of Mrs. Dexter and the committee in such a good cause.
