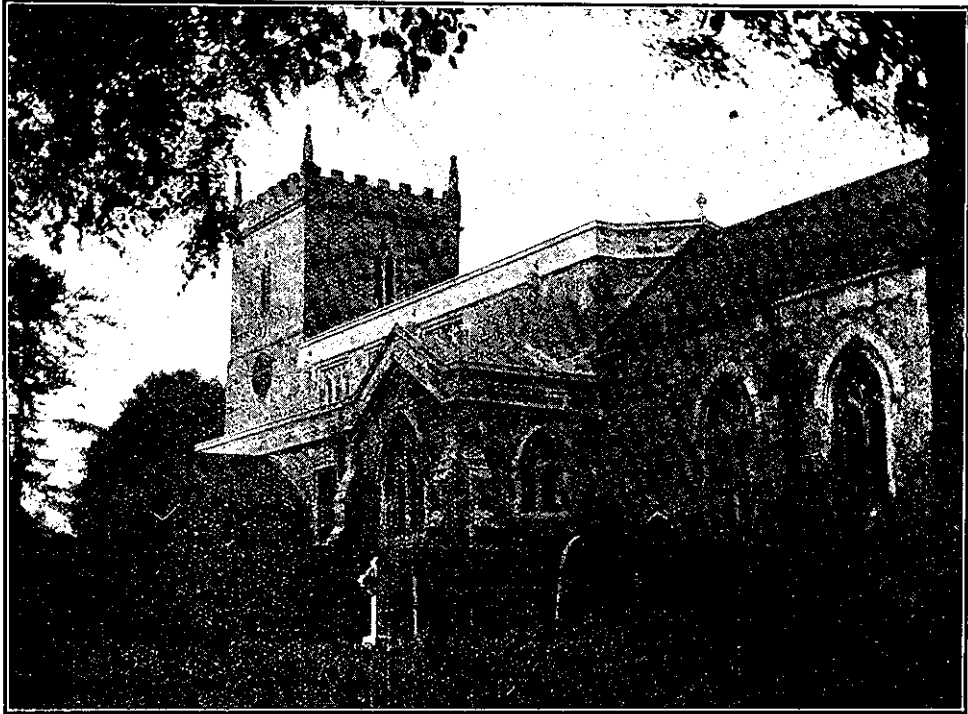

A Confirmation will be held at Bingham Church, on Tuesday, March 9th. The Rector hopes that those who desire to be presented will let him know at once, that arrangements may be made during this month for due preparation.

THE ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING for the election of the Church Council, the presentation of Church Accounts, and the appointment of Sidesmen, etc., will be held on Tuesday, January 26th, 1926, in the school at 7 p.m. All whose names are upon the Electoral Roll are entitled to attend, and should endeavour to do so to show an interest in Church affairs.

On Friday, November 27th, a memorial service was held in Church at 12 o'clock, followed by a muffled peal, while the funeral of the late Queen Mother, Alexandra, was taking place at Westminster Abbey; and the services on Advent Sunday, November 29th, marked the deep love and sense of loss which the whole nation felt. The "Dead March" was played at the close.

Many will like to have the prayer suggested by the Archbishop which was very generally used on this occasion.

O GOD, in whose embrace all creatures live: we beseech Thee for Her whom we leave in Thy keeping, and whose every need Thou knowest; vouchsafe her light and rest, peace and refreshment, joy and consolation in the ample folds of Thy great love; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

On the following Sunday, December 6th, this Diocese had its own great sorrow, and the Holy Eucharist and Evening Service were memorial of our late Bishop, the Rector preaching in the evening on II Tim. ii 15, "A workman that needeth not be ashamed."

Our beloved Bishop, the Right Reverend Sir Edwyn Hoskyns, Bt. entered into his rest on Wednesday, December 2nd, and was buried at Southwell on Saturday, December 5th, at the good age of 74. It is 50 years

since he received Priest's Orders. During his ministry he gained a wide experience of parochial work in poor and populous London parishes where he did valuable work during the Dockers' Strike of 1889, and in the manufacturing towns of Bolton and Burnley. In 1901 he was consecrated Suffragan-Bishop of Burnley. In 1904 he headed a Mission of Help to the South African Church, and on his way home the offer of the vacant see of Southwell reached him on the death of Dr. Ridding, the first bishop of that new see.

For the last 21 years he has worked untiringly as Pastor and Father of this large and populous diocese which includes the counties of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire. His first concern as Bishop was the visitation of every one of the 520 parishes, which took over four years to accomplish, and convinced him of the urgency of the division into two dioceses. The full realization of this desire was not to be in his life time; but a great effort is being made to complete the funds for the new see of Derby, and to secure the whole energies of the next Bishop of Southwell for its own county. This will be the best memorial of Bishop Hoskyns' work.

THE LANTERN LECTURE on Southwell Diocese was given by Canon F. J. Adams, on November 26th, in the Temperance Hall. It was an interesting account of the two counties which were associated to form a new Diocese in 1884. As a result of the lecture, and from contributions since, £20 has been sent up to the Fund for the Division of the Diocese.

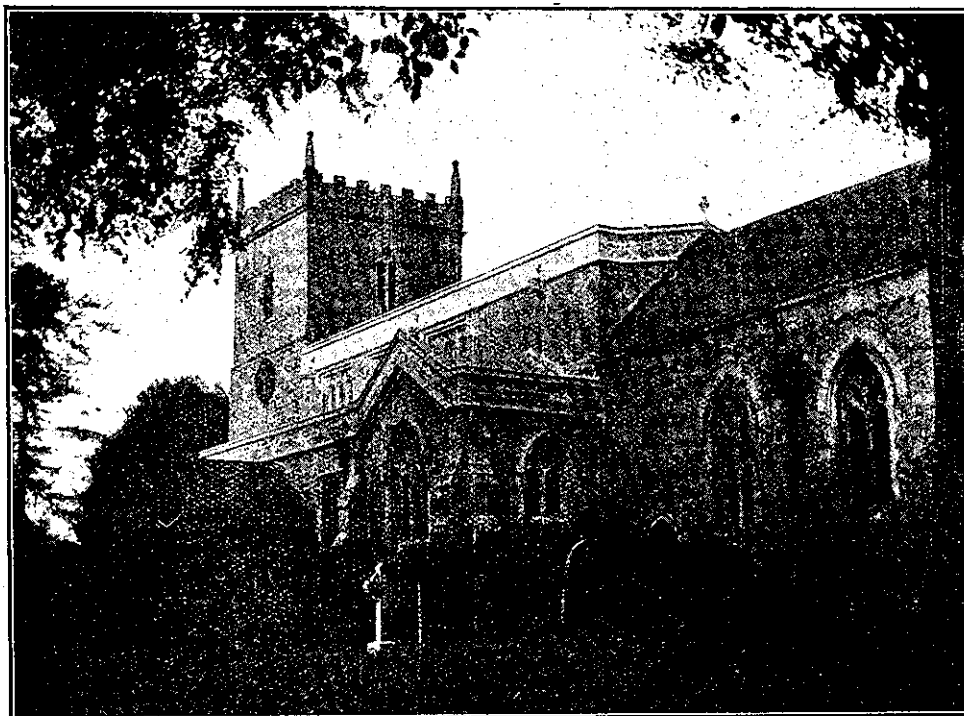

THE BISHOPRIC OF SOUTHWELL.—The King has been pleased to approve the appointment of the Rev. Bernard Oliver Francis Heywood, M.A., to the vacant bishopric of this Diocese.

Mr. Heywood is in his 55th year, and has been Vicar of Leeds since 1917. For 25 years before that he had worked in parishes in his native Lancashire, where he gained a reputation as a man of wide sympathies and effective work among an industrial population.

LENT 1926.—Wednesday, Feb. 17th, is the first day of Lent, commonly known as Ash Wednesday. Lent is a timely warning given us by the Church of the approach of the solemn season of Holy Week and Good Friday and of the high festival of Easter. Lent is also a useful help to those who will try to carry out the notable duties of Religion, commended to us by our Lord in the Sermon on the Mount under the heads of Prayer, Almsgiving and Self-control, or in other words, our duties to God, our neighbour, and ourselves.

I make the following suggestions, that our aims may be as practical as possible :—(1) Will you be more regular in attendance at Church during Lent ; (2) Will you do an act of Lenten self-denial by making a contribution to the Fund for the Division of the Diocese, either placing it in the appropriate Box on the left hand as you enter the Church, or using one of the Free-will Offering envelopes and sending it to me, marked with its purpose, before the end of Lent.

If you will during Lent really try to follow out these principles in your own way, you will find that they will help to raise permanently the standard of your life, so that each Lent will make you a more earnest and faithful Christian.

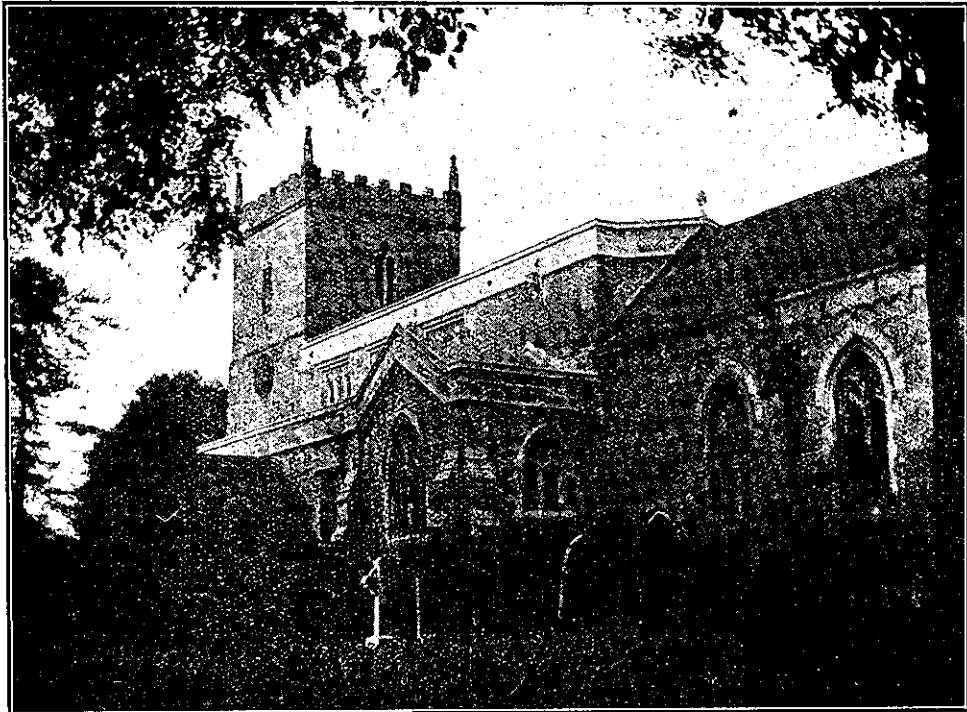

MOTHERING SUNDAY.—The 4th Sunday in Lent, or Mid-Lent Sunday, was in many parts of England associated with some beautiful old customs, which have died out the last few generations, though some old people still remember them with very tender emotions. The day was known as Mothering Sunday, when sons and daughters who had left home and gone out into the world to work, or perhaps to find a new home of their own, would make a point of coming home on Saturday to see Mother, and to bring to her their gifts—especially a cake and a bunch of violets. This was not all, for on Sunday morning the whole gathered family would go together to the Service in the Mother Church, remembering the words in the Epistle for the day—"Jerusalem, the mother of us all."

It was a truly happy time. Perhaps the eldest daughter would be full of pride in the first Simnel cake, as it was sometimes called, of her own making. Perhaps some of the sons and daughters would pass very slowly along the lane as they renewed their childhood's acquaintance:—

"Who goes a-Mothering finds violets in the lane."

It makes a beautiful picture of the piety and home-life of old England. Is it lost to us? A revival of such customs is beginning in some places. The Mothers' Union longs for the year that shall see every mother remembered by her children with due honour on Mothering Sunday, and none need be ashamed of being a little sentimental in such things. It will revive when piety and home-life are truly valued and desired.

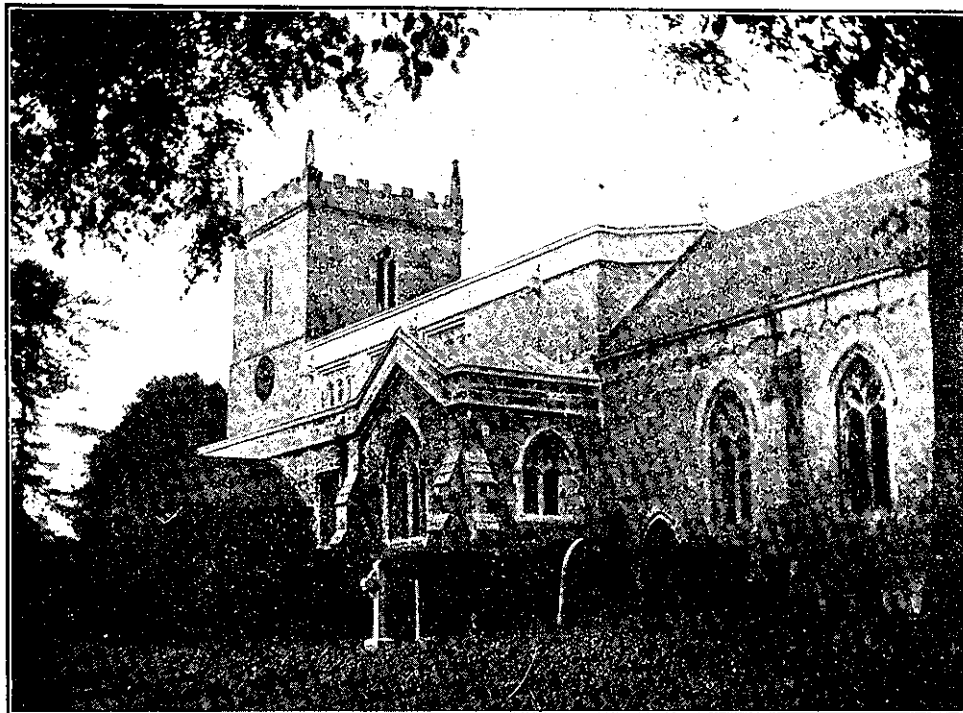

THE CHURCH AT EASTER. It is a simple and beautiful old English custom to decorate Churches on festivals. In fact this way of bringing in the smallest of God's works to praise Him is extremely ancient, and is mentioned several times by early Christian writers; especially by St. Jerome about the year 400 A.D. who does not think it unworthy to be mentioned in a funeral sermon on his friend Nepotian, that such was his pious care for the Divine worship that he made flowers and leaves and vine-branches contribute to the ornament of his Church. "These things," says St. Jerome, "were indeed trifling in themselves; but a pious mind, devoted to Christ, is intent upon small things as well as great, and neglects nothing that pertains even to the meanest office of the Church." Spring-time flowers, coming as they do after the dreary death-like winter, are particularly suitable at Easter, as being types of the Resurrection from the grave. It has been the custom in many places on Easter morning to adorn with flowers the graves of those who died within the year. Our Memorial Cross will not be left without its usual tribute.

But first of all let us be eager to offer ourselves, soul and body, in thankful remembrance of Christ's Death and Resurrection, at the Holy Eucharist on Easter Day. There will be ample opportunity for all, with celebrations at 7 and 8 o'clock and at Midday, and on the following Sunday at 8; but whatever the time or place, we are assured thereby that we are indeed members of Christ's Holy Fellowship, united with Him in His great Intercession for all as we faithfully fulfil our bounden duty and service.

THE CONFIRMATION took place in Bingham Church on Thursday, March 11th, when the Bishop of Derby administered the sacred rite to 82 candidates from neighbouring parishes, including nine from our own.

THE BISHOP OF SOUTHWELL, consecrated at Westminster Abbey on March 25th, will be enthroned in his seat at Southwell Cathedral at 2.30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 21st.

The Editor of the Magazine apologises for the omission of the name of Mr. W. R. Sharman, from the list of Sidesmen, who were all re-appointed at the Parochial Church Meeting in January.

THE VESTRY MEETING for the appointment of Churchwardens will take place on Tuesday in Easter Week, April 6th, at 7.30 p.m. The meeting is open to all ratepayers as well as to those on the Church Electoral roll, in as much as the Churchwardens are the legal guardians not only of Church property but of the rights of every parishioner with regard to it. In former days, whenever any new law required new parochial duties to be set up, such as those of guardians of the poor, or overseers of the rates, the Churchwardens were naturally the first persons called upon to fulfil them; but in recent years they have quite rightly been relieved of these extraneous duties, while they still remain representatives of the parish in their own sphere of action.

THE CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING, on March 16th, in arranging its annual budget and the apportionment of Church collections, decided that this year the Easter Offerings should be placed at the disposal of the Rector. This is in fact a revival of the ancient church custom, which has only fallen into abeyance in this parish during the last century, by which Easter dues were a part of the benefice. The Rector intends to divide the amount between the poor Clergy relief fund of the diocese and certain needs of our own Church.

The Band of Hope held a social evening in the Temperance Hall on Feb. 16th. Songs were given by V. Boyce and M. Fossey, and Recitals by R. Wilkinson and D. Morris. The Boys' Brigade gave an excellent display of Physical Training, Parallel Bars and Tumbling. The proceeds, £5 1s., are given to the senior members summer outing fund.

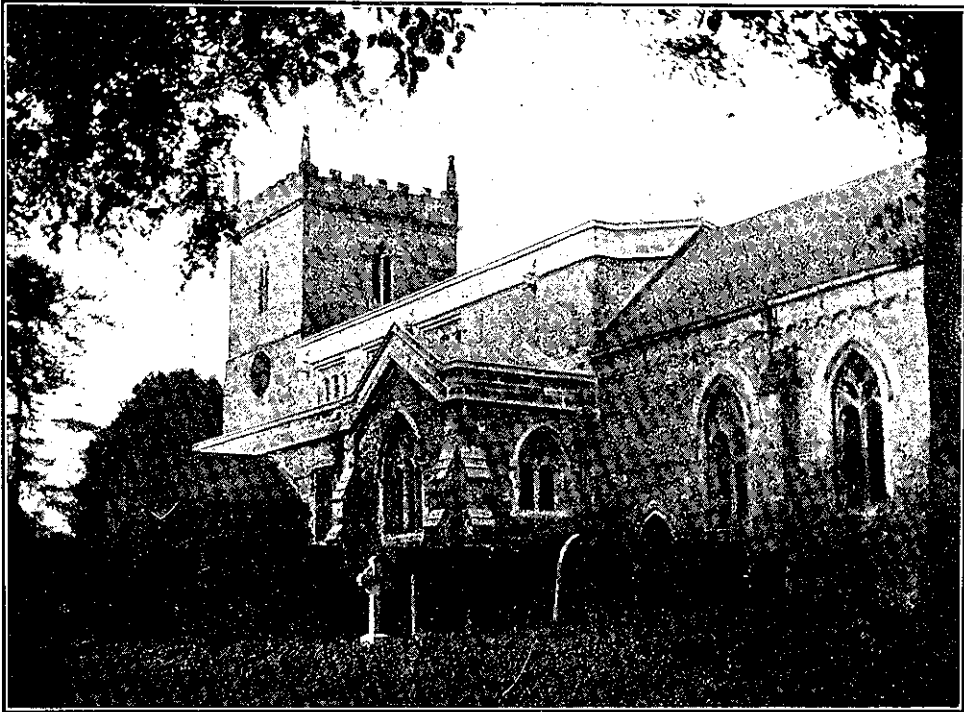

EASTER DAY was fair and bright, and the services, which were well attended, especially the three celebrations of the Holy Eucharist, made it also a happy festival. The genial weather extending over several days made an ideal holiday time.

AT THE EASTER VESTRY, held on Tuesday, April 6th, Mr. R. K. Beaumont and Mr. F. S. Molyneux were re-appointed Churchwardens.

OUR NEW BISHOP, the Rev. Bernard Oliver Heywood, was consecrated in Westminster Abbey on the Feast of the Annunciation, March 25th, together with two other newly chosen bishops, by the Archbishop of Canterbury and his suffragans, the Bishops of London, Winchester, Oxford, Chichester and Ripon. On Wednesday, April 21st, he was enthroned by the Archdeacon of Canterbury, after the 1st Lesson at Evensong in Southwell Cathedral. The words "Cathedral" and "see" have the same original meaning of "seat," and both refer to the local centre of a Bishop's jurisdiction.

The Bishop will pay his first visit to the Rural Deanery of Bingham on June 7th, at a meeting of the Clergy and the Lay Representatives of the Deanery.

ASCENSION DAY is on Thursday, May 13th. There will be a Celebration at 8 a.m., and service at 9.15 and at 7.30. The offerings are to be given to the Diocesan Missionary Students' Fund.

ON WHITSUNDAY, May 23rd, there will be Holy Communion at 8 and mid-day. The offerings will be for funds of the East Bridgford School.

THE BAND OF HOPE gave their Annual Concert on Easter Monday. The programme included solos by Misses A. Soles, O. Boyce, V. Boyce and R. Brown, and a duet by Miss M. Fossey and A. Mawer; the senior boys gave a dumb-bell drill, and the junior members an operetta entitled "Princess Tiny Tot." There was also a humorous sketch "Dr. Diaculum, and a prettily arranged Cantata "Soot and the Fairies." The proceeds amounted to £13 4s. 0d.

THE SCHOOL. The managers, teachers and children much regret that Miss Mabel Garford is resigning her post as assistant teacher, owing to family reasons. She has not only been an efficient teacher, but has thoroughly identified herself with the interests of the school and endeared herself to the children.

DIOCESAN SUNDAY. On Rogation Sunday, May 9th, the Annual Call is made upon every parish in the Diocese to take its share in contributing to the pressing needs of the rapidly increasing population and the various branches of Church work that are being carried on in the diocese of Southwell. 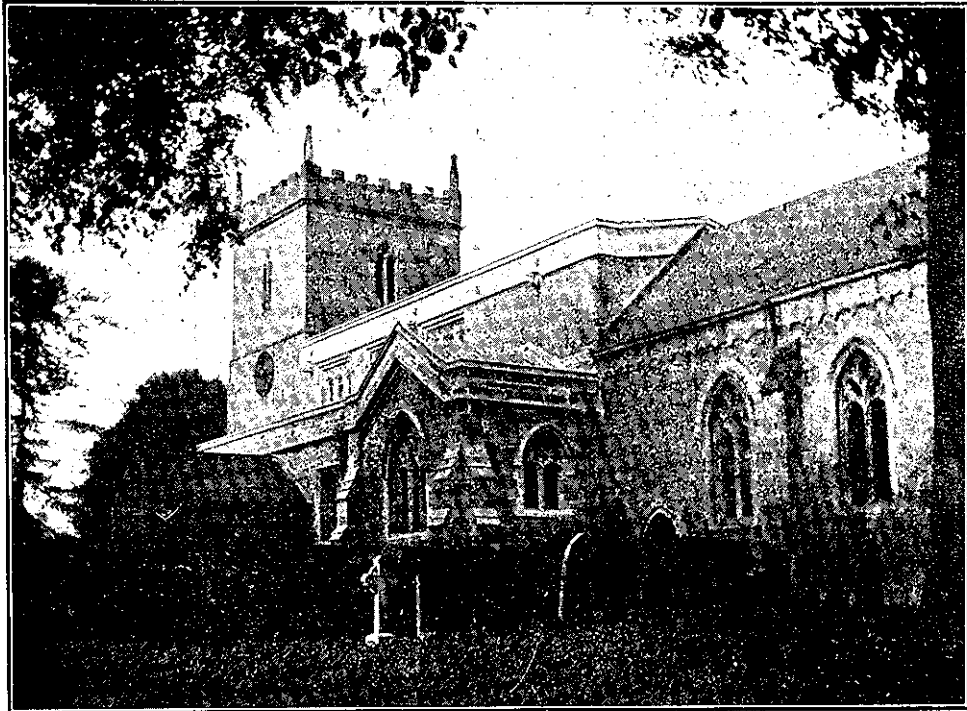

NOTTINGHAM GENERAL HOSPITAL.—A Collection of 514 eggs for the benefit of patients has been made from the East Bridgford members of the Women's Institute, and Girl Guides have collected 640 in the village, total 1154. Mrs. E. E. Coville organized this successful collection, and the eggs were kindly delivered by Mr. C. Bullers, and acknowledged by the Matron in an appreciative letter of thanks.

MOTHERS' UNION.—The members held a social tea and sale in the Women's Institute Hut on Tuesday, May 18th, the net proceeds amounting to £7 16s. 7d.

THE TRENT NAVIGATION SCHEME, which was transferred to the Nottingham Corporation under an Act of Parliament in 1915, but being delayed by the War, was not actually begun until 1921, has now been nearly completed; and on June 25th, Mr. Neville Chamberlain will perform the opening ceremony of the completed work by which the Trent becomes a navigable river between Hull and the Midlands, and Nottingham may call itself an inland port.

The first lock at Holmepierrepoint was opened by Dr. Macnamara, the Minister of Labour, on September 29th, 1922; Stoke Bardolph lock, was opened a year later; Gunthorpe lock was opened September 29th, 1925, by Mr. H. B. Betterton, M.P. for Rushcliffe Division, and Hazleford lock is now completed, as well as the Nether Lock at Newark. Each of the new locks will hold a steam tug with its train of three 100-ton barges. The whole cost is estimated at £408,000 and the work has afforded continuous relief to unemployed labour for five years.

Progress has been made with the new road to the north, and at the present moment the Newton Road is being lowered to the new level of the main road which crosses it. The new bridge over the Trent is also progressing and the works will be visited this month by the Birmingham Association of Engineers.

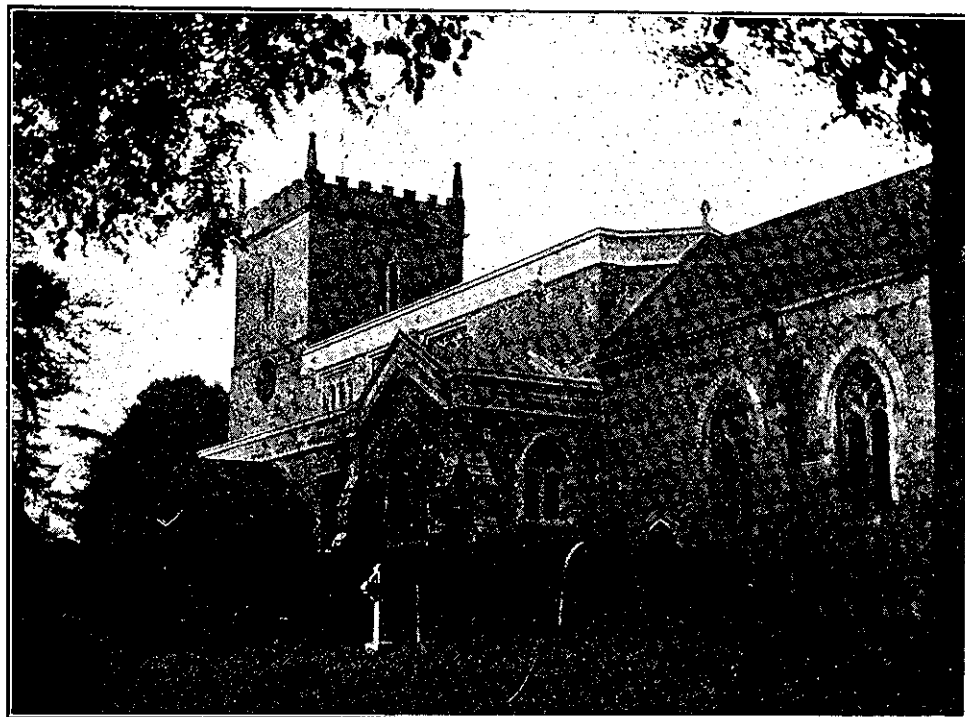

On Monday, June 7th, the Bishop of Southwell paid his first visit to the Rural Deanery of Bingham. The Meeting was held in the Rectory Garden at Bingham, when the Bishop first met the Clergy of the Deanery, and then the Parochial Representatives. At five o'clock, there was tea provided, followed by a general meeting attended by some 250 persons, including Church Councillors from all the 19 parishes, the Chairman being the Rural Dean.

Our new Bishop was welcomed in a speech by the Rev. E. St. J. Morse, Vicar of Shelford, as the senior incumbent in the Deanery, and by Mr. John James of Cotgrave, speaking on behalf of the laity.

The Bishop in his reply spoke of his previous experience in Leeds, and referred to his earnest desire for the completion of the scheme for dividing this very large and populous diocese into two, with a Bishop over each of the Counties of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire. It was not because it would give him less work to do, but because it would enable him to devote more time to the most essential part of a Bishop's work, the personal pastoral oversight of his diocese.

Canon F. J. Adams, Hon. Organizing Secretary, make a rousing appeal to the parishes of the Deanery to do their part towards raising the last £14,000, in which he was earnestly seconded by C. F. Elliott-Smith, Esq., a Diocesan Representative in the Church Assembly.

The Archdeacon of Nottingham proposed a vote of thanks to the Rector of Bingham, who was unfortunately prevented by illness from being present, for kindly allowing the use of his garden, and making arrangements for this meeting.

The proceedings ended by Evensong in Bingham Church at 7.30, at which the Bishop gave an address. The Collection, for the Division of the Diocese, was £8 11s. 3d.

The Fund for the Division of the Diocese has been increased by £25,000 during the past year. An additional £7,000 from each of the two counties should now see the fund completed. There are no doubt still some in East Bridgford, who would like to add their contribution to this very important part of Church work. The Rector will be glad to receive and forward any Subscriptions, however small, or they may be placed in the Church box on the left hand side on entering the Church. Do it now.

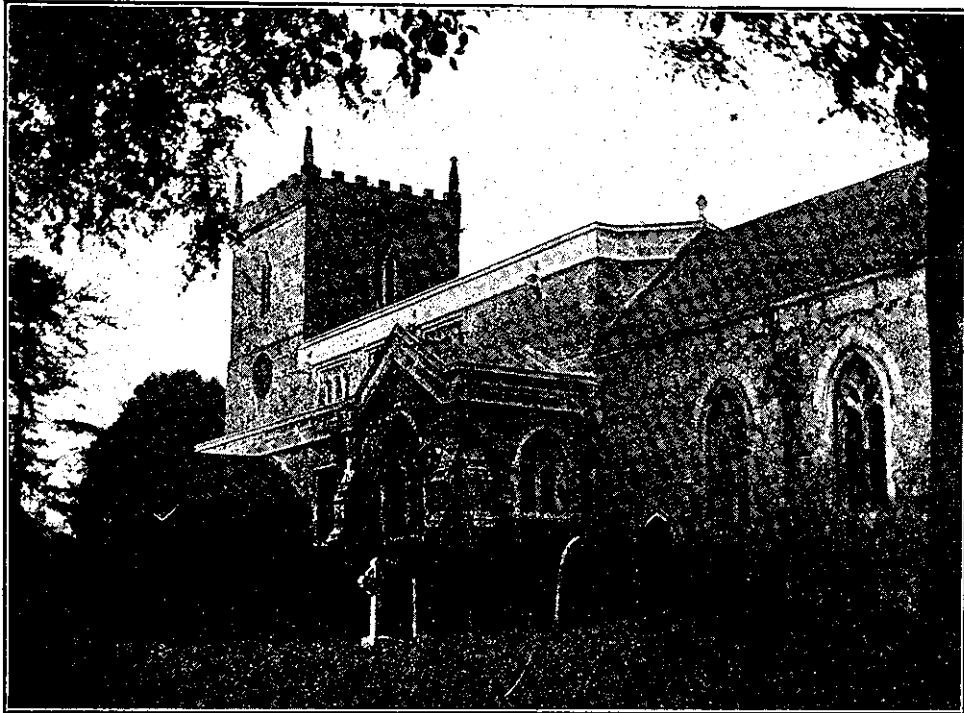

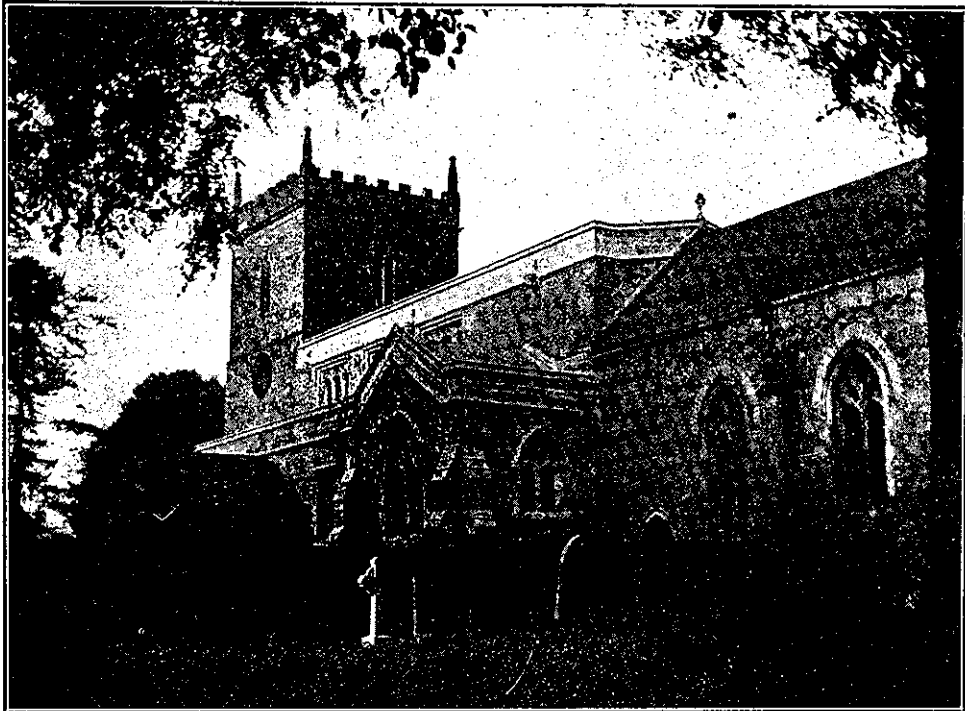

THE WORLD'S CALL FOR MISSIONARY WORK.

During this year a very real effort is being made to face the fact that the World calls upon Christian people to give greater help in the guiding and constructive forces needed at the present time. Great movements are shaking the foundations and altering the whole aspect of human society. Old races are awakening, new races are discovering their needs. Opportunity such as has not been found before is opening.

The Missionary Council of the Church of England has therefore endeavoured to gather up the needs and objects of the various societies which have worked too long in isolation, and to express first of all in terms of workers and money what the actual need really is. 600 new workers and £250,000 annually are required, in addition to the million pounds already contributed.

Four very comprehensive reports have been issued already, which I would gladly lend to anyone interested in them.

1. **AFRICA.**—At the door of the Church stands the African, awakening from the age-long sleep of primitive man. He knocks, asking for education—Christian education. Government and missionary alike desire to give it to him. Will the Church open the door of the Christian School, or must he and his hundred million brothers and sisters go elsewhere—perhaps to Islam? Two hundred new missionaries, mostly teachers, are demanded at once.

2. **INDIA.**—Knocking at the door, stands an outcaste man from the village. He, and millions like him, are clamouring for admission to the Church and for instruction. The Church's door is but half open. To all but a few hundred thousand, she says "You cannot enter. We have no teachers for you." Aloof, but watching these mass movements closely, stands the educated Indian: "I shall never enter that door," he says. Yet he reverences the Teaching and the Person of Christ. He, no less than the outcaste, must be won to surrender to Christ as Lord.

3. **THE FAR EAST.**—The key-note of the Report is Renaissance. Into the crucible of the Far East has been poured Western education and every kind of Western institution. Thus have been created all those political, economic, racial and religious problems of world import, with which the Pacific area is seething. The rebirth of great peoples—China, Japan and Korea—is accompanied by turmoil and confusion. The Christians of those lands call to the Church of England to open the door of her treasure house and to send them the best of her sons and daughters, who, working side by side with the young Churches of the Orient, may secure that Christian education and the Christian spirit play their part in shaping the destiny of the Far East and thus the destiny of the world.

4. **THE MOSLEM WORLD.**—Accessibility is the key-note of the Call. Islam, for centuries an impregnable fortress, implacably hostile to Christianity, is shaken from Morocco to China by the results of war. The mind and spirit of Islam are open for the first time in history to outside influences, amongst them to the Christian message; but how few of her sons pass through the Church's door to give this message to Islam!

This call is now being made in almost every parish in the land. It may seem that a small village can do but little, that it is not likely any new workers will be found in them, but that is no reason why we should not listen and take an interest in what appeals to earnest and thoughtful Christians. For instance, we can increase our contributions by a quarter of what we have previously given; we can regard the duty of the Church at home in a new aspect; we can think of it not merely as something additional, but as something essential in the work of our Church, to which we have not paid sufficient attention; we can listen to it as the call of our Master, Jesus Christ, to each one of us, for the world, as well as the call of the World for Christ.

THE CHURCH SUNDAY SCHOOL was entertained at tea on Thursday, August 5th, in the W.I. Hut, under the superintendence of Mrs. Cartwright. The boys played a cricket match with Bingham boys in which the visitors were victorious. By the invitation of Miss Fox the party amused themselves in the garden at the Hall.

On Sunday morning, August 15th, two distinct shocks of the Earthquake were felt at East Bridgford, about 4 and 5 a.m. It was very generally noticed in the Midlands and the South of England.

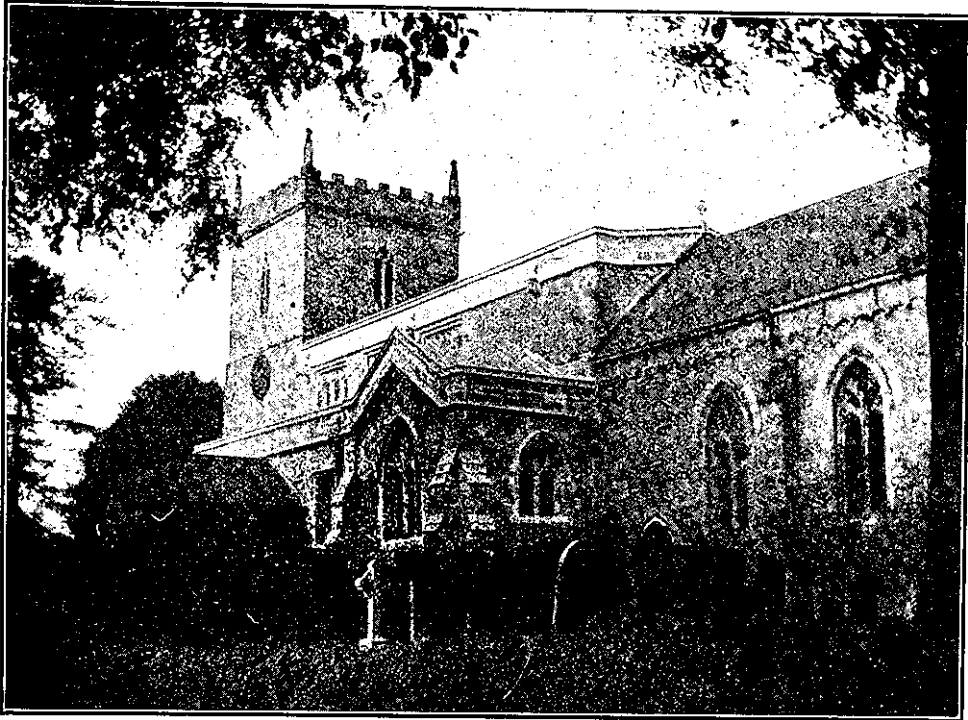

MY DEAR PARISHIONERS,

I have an announcement to make to you, which I trust you will believe I make with very great regret. I have now decided that the time has come when I ought to resign my work as Rector of East Bridgford, and I intend to do so at the beginning of 1927. I shall then have entered the 77th year of my age, and completed my 50th year in Holy Orders of the Ministry of the Church.

I feel that for a parish of such individuality and energy as East Bridgford displays, the work of the Church should correspond with the new life and new opportunities which are always opening out; and for some time now I have felt conscious that I cannot continue to give to it the full vigour and intimate attention which I have always known to be essential to a parish priest's work.

The infirmities of age cannot be avoided, and my increasing deafness and diminishing power of getting about bring with them a depressing consciousness of things left undone. Probably few people realize the amount and variety of the work that often falls to the lot of the country parson. It means far more than being at one's post and conducting services on Sunday. It is work for which one is only answerable to an All-seeing Master, and the responsibility is very great.

I will say no more now, but I want everyone to understand my intention, and my very sincere sorrow at leaving East Bridgford which I have learnt to know and to love as my home for nearly twenty-nine years:

The brilliant meteor which was seen over a wide area in the Midlands about 10 p.m. on Monday, September 6th, was observed at East Bridgford, accompanied by the rumbling sound of its passage through the air. 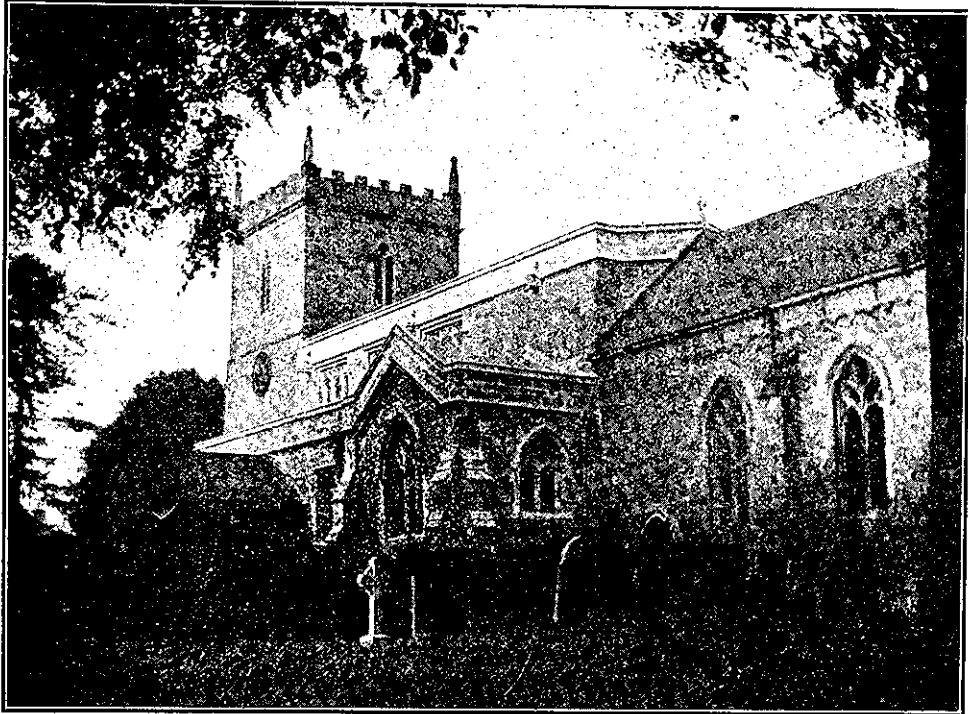

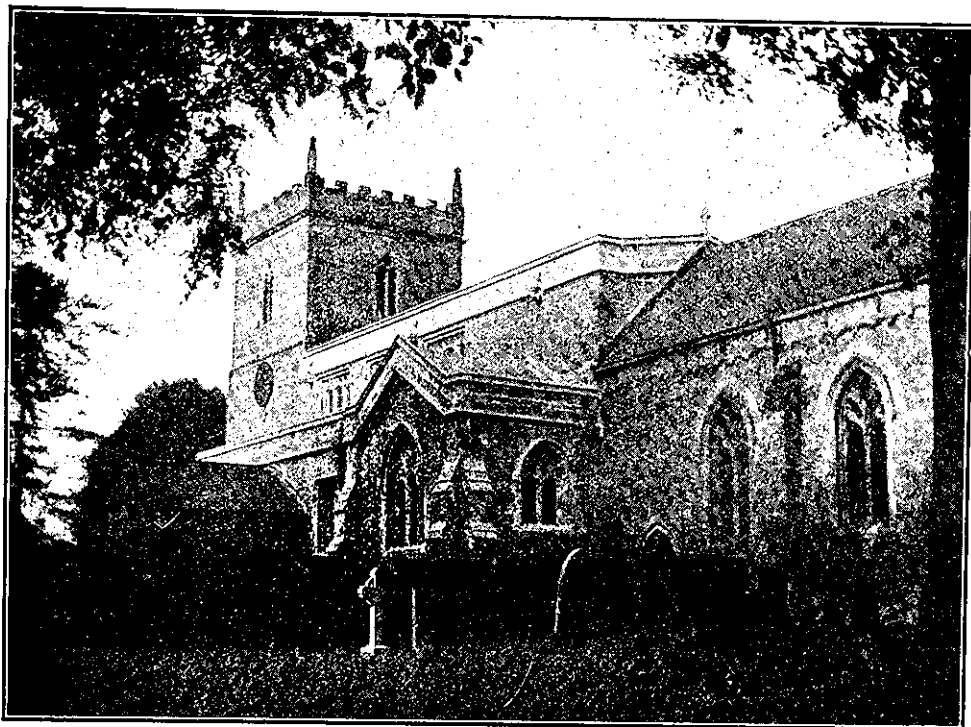
