THE ROYAL MARTYR - Obit and Requiem.

On 30th January 1649 on a Scaffold in Whitehall King Charles was beheaded. At 8 p.m. on Friday 29th January 1971, the eve of the Anniversary, in loyal and honoured memory a recording of the Requiem Mass by Verdi will be played in St. Peter's Church, East Bridgford. Collection in aid of Church Funds.

On Saturday 30th January 1971 8 a.m. the Obit will be observed and Requiem Mass said.

Manzoni Requiem, often known as the Requiem Mass. It is a work of genius commemorating in a great musical composition, the poet whom he regarded as the purest, the most saintly and exalted manifestation of Italian genius. The Requiem was performed for the first time in St. Mark's Church at Milan on 28th May 1874 under Verdi's direction.

Alexsandra Manzoni (1785-1873) was an Italian Dramatist, poet and Novelist, one of the classics of Italian literature whose most famous work is the movel 'I Promessi Sposi' (1825-27) praised by Sir Walter Scott as 'the best ever written'.

IN MEMORIAM

NORMAN HALL identified himself with every aspect and activity of Village life in East Bridgford from his schooldays here under Mr. Rhodes, membership of the Boys Brigade, War Service in R.A.O.C. For • time he was Clerk of the Parish Council and latterly Councillor. He was an active member and officer of the local British Legion and was moposed as next Chairman. He was a Secretary of the Horticultural Society and most energetic member of King Edward's Club, not least in raising funds to keep it solvent. It was long his ambition to serve in the Police, but he was not tall enough: yet he was an invaluable Special Constable and well earned his promotion to Sergeant. He was a keen member of the Cricket and Football Clubs and an exceptionally able assistant to the Medical Officer of Helth on the staff of the Bingham Rural District Council.

This modest public-spirited friend and neighbour has left a gap in our midst which no one man can fill. The Welfare of others seemed to be his natural and instinctive concern. Long may his memory be honoured and his example emulated amongst us.

Dear Rector,

Many parishioners who pay Income Tax and who support the church in various ways do not realise that by signing a simple form of covenant considerable financial gain would accrue to the church by way of repayment of Income Tax.

For example a covenant to pay £13 a year (the equivalent of a weekly contribution of 5/-, or 25p, per week), would produce the following results:

As the income of the church is not liable to Income Tax, in the present tax year the £9.2.7d. (£9.13.) or for the tax year 1971/72 £8.4.6d. (£8.23.) would be repaid to the church by the Inland Revenue after the end of each tax year in respect of every such covenant.


Any subsequent changes in the rate of Income Tax would, of course, alter the amount of the refund but the same principle would remain.

Anniversaries - January 30th 1649 Public execution of Charles 1. 1661 Public execration of Oliver Cromwell.

On January 30th 1649 after "trial" in Westminster Hall, on a scaffold outside the Banqueting Hall of Whitehall Palace King Charles died a martyr's death; Whereas Oliver Cromwell, chiefly responsible therefore, himself died a natural death on a bed inside Whitehall Palace in the year 1658.

On another January 30th, exactly twelve years later, 1661 the exhumed carcase of Oliver was hanged in chains at Tyburn to public execration: his severed head was placed on a pole on top of Westminster Hall.

Whatever your verdict on these atrocities, the fact remains that for good or ill Oliver, warts and all, delivered his country from a succession of three possible evils, absolute monarchy, presbyterian tyranny, internecine dismemberment. So each January 30th Oliver asks for more - than the passing tribute of a sigh! Does he not deserve more as the greatest hero of his day, God's Englishman or regicide and rebel?

And to this very day, 30th January 1971, in Westminster and Whitehall the relation of Church and State is still under active discussion. Today heads are more usually counted than severed in Westminster and Whitehall.

cal Government Reform - The long awaited and possibly final White Paper on the future of Local dovernment has just been published. In contrast to the earlier Maud report it does provide a level of Local Government between the Parish Council, which remains unchanged with power rather than duties, and the New Main Authority which in our area will link the City and the Geographical County. This level will be known as a District Council and might well consist of the same geographical area as the New Rushcliffe Constituency, namely Bingham R.D.C. West Bridgford EDC, and the Southern part of Basford RDC though the whole matter of bounderies

are subject to discussion and consultation and in the event of disagreement a Boundary Commission. The principal functions of the New district council. will be Planning development control, in consultation with the main authority, Housing, both building and management, and Refuse Collection. The changes should mean a simpler more effective system of Local Government in a new pattern of fewer authorities of responsibility from Central government to local government, and retain important powers at a more local level as of right. Elections for the New Councils are planned to take place in Spring 1973 for the County and Autumn 73 for the Districts. When you consider that the last changes were in 1894 before the Motor Car or Electricity were part of our lives some reform is long overdue.

which will have to be made.



A TRIBUTE TO CHARLES HERBERT DUNSMORE

Charlie Dunsmore served on the Parish Council from 1957, most of the time as Vice-Chairman. He was a regular Churchman who augmented the Choir from time to time and painstakingly painted and decorated the whole interior of the Church.

Among other public buildings in East Bridgford the Village Hall now modernized is a lasting demorial to his energy and enthusiasm; for it was under his Chairmanship that the long planned improvements were finally realized. He completed ₹6 years in the Police Force, during the war years he served as Sergeant in East Bridgford. In 1955 he settled here to begin a second career as fainter and Decorator. Strenuous Service to thers was the hallmark of his life's work and it was maintained to the end. R.I.P. (D.D.A)



CHURCHWARDENS hold as honourable and ancient an office as any known in English history; in fact they have existed from early times throughout Christendon. In England under various statutes until the end of the last century they were also charged with the administration of the poor law and other civil duties. Today they are primarily parochial lay officers of the Bishop. They have duties. responsibilities and liabilities - but neither remuneration nor reward. A churchwarden cannot resign during the year but he vacates office on conviction of treason or felony followed by a prison sentence of hard labour or exceeding 12 months. Nowadays these risks have little relevance except that 12 months hard labour is what conscientious churchwardens undertake rather than undergo. A vacancy by death is not usually filled unless both churchwardens die. Dr. G. O. Brooks, GM, Mc, confirms the prognosis that that contingency is unlikely to occur in East Bridgford in 1971/2.

Churchwardens are admitted to office by the Archdeacon at his annual visitation or, in the year of an episcopel visitation by the Bishop or his Chancellor. This year our Churchwardens will

They shall be foremost in representing the laity and in co-operating with the incumbent; they shall use their best endeavours by example and precipt to encourage the parishioers in the practice of true religion and to promote unity and peace among them. They shall also maintain order and decency in the Church and the Churchyard, especially during the time of Divine Service".

16th MAY - ROGATION SUNDAY 1971

Rogation Sunday is ordered to be observed by the Rector, Churchwardens and Parishioners by Praying for God's Blessing on the fruits of the earth and the labours of men; and as the tradional day for "Beating the Bounds" of the parishes. This year the common boundary between the parishes of Gunthorpe and East Bridgford viz. midstream of the River Trent will be beaten.

The <u>HACKER MONUMENT</u> epitomizes the place East Bridgford holds in National history. The perennial and widespread interest in the most Dramatic event in English history viz the execution of King Charles 1. still attracts visitors to our Village and to Nottinghamshire.

The HACKER FAMILY MONUMENT on the north wall in East Bridgford Church represents John Hacker and his wife kneeling, looking at each other across a pre-Diew, with their four sons and three daughters kneeling in the predella below; of these the eldest was the father of Francis, Rowland and Thomas Hacker.

To the eldest, Colonel Francis Hacker the death warrant for the King was addressed and by virtue

of it he escorts Charles to the scaffold. In consequence Francis was hanged at Tyburn and intered in St. Nicholas Cole Abbey, London.

The second, Captain Rowland was a Cavalier who lost his arm defending Newark; the youngest Thomas serving under his brother Rowland was killed at Colston Bassett. Rowland and Thomas are buried in East Bridgford Churchyard. Plans are in hand to restore the Monument. After 350 years it needs cleaning and repairing. Descendents of the Hacker family have already contributed to the cost. All who treasure Civil Liberties which are now the birthright of every British Subject and honour thom who fought and suffered on their behalf no doubt will wish to contribute too.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK May 17 - 24th

The collection taken at the Open Air Service at Gunthorpe Riverside raised £15 for Christian Aid. This joint effort of Lowdham, Gunthorpe and East Bridgford on Rogation Sunday 1971 demonstrates that the river Trent can be a bond rather than a barrier. The annual "beating of the bounds" indicates areas and fields of common contact and concern rather than demarcation and limits of responsibility. It is to be hoped that the new local government structures will be neighbourhood councils to extend neighbourliness especially between Town and Country. Thanks to the hard work of house-to-house collectors East Bridgford was able to contribute also £37.34 towards Christian Aid's programme of development, rehabitation and refugee work. There is not a more worthy or more comprehensive charity for Christians to support.

The Cromwell Association has made a grant of £25 towards the cost of the restoration of the Hacker Monument in East Bridgford Church. The Cromwell Association was founded in 1935 with the aims of

preserving the memory of Oliver Cromwell and of promoting and encouraging research into the histery of the Commonwealth Protectorate. Colonel Francis Hacker was a leading personality in crucial events of that period. The association is not a political organization and its aims are principally distorical and antiquarian. The association would welcome new members.



The HACKER Family Monument represents John Hacker (ob. 1616) and his wife kneeling, looking at each other across a prie-dieu; with their four sons and three daughters kneeling in the predella below. The eldest son was father of Francis and of Thomas.

The monument occupies a prominent position among the BRUNTS Family Memorials. The monument and the other memorials are in process of restoration. FRANCIS was the Cromwellian hero responsible for the execution of King Charles 1 but was hanged as a Rebel and Regicide; he married Isabella, aunt of SAMUEL BRUNTS. THOMAS was the Royalist hero who was killed fighting for the ROYAL MARTYR.

The Rector and Churchwardens hope that all who have reason or are in duty bound to honour the memory of any of these several famous names and causes, whether as Ancestors or Benefactors, as Martyrs or Heroes may feel disposed to send a contribution to the Restoration Fund, St. Peter's Church, East Bridgford, Notts. NG 13 8PE.

***ONSERVATION and POLLUTION



St Edward's Crown named after the Spanish King, Edward the Confessor, is the traditional crown of England and was actually used for the coronation of H.M. Queen Elizabeth 11 on 2nd June 1953. It was made in 1661 for the coronation of King Richard 11 and closely follows the design of the original destroyed by the Commonwealth; made of gold it is set with diamonds, pearls and coloured gems: it weighs almost 5 lbs and is therefore only worn for the actual ceremony of coronation.

The original St. Edward's Crown was used by Dr. Owen Oglethorpe (Rector of East Bridgford 1538 - 1557) to crown H.M. Queen Elizabeth 1 on the 15th January 1559. Queen Mary had appointed him Dean of Windsor and Registra of the Most Noble Order of the Garter and then Bishop of Carlisle: she had also caused Archbishop Cranmer to be burnt at Oxford. And so it came to pass that her successor Queen Elizabeth 1 was crowned by the junior Bishop who had been Rector of East Bridgford from 1538 - 1557.

PRAYER BOOK REVISION 1972

Due to be published shortly is the latest revision of the Holy Communion Service in which there will be modern translations of the Gloria, Creed etc; already published and authorized for use from next Advent are radically new forms of Morning and Evening Prayer.

The Series Ill rite follows the broad outline and structure of Series Il but employs a more modern style of Liturgical English, including addressing God as 'You'.

MUSIC in CHURCH

Restoration of the organ must be put in hand immediately to prevent further deterioration. Emergancy repairs have to be undertaken at a cost of £100; otherwise the organ will become permamently useless. All lovers of Music, especially Choral and Church are earnestly invited to come to the rescue.

A FAMOUS NONAGENARIAN

Dr. Felix Oswald born 1866 died in 1958 aged 92 years! In East Bridgford during the years 1910 -1936 almost single handed he excavated Roman MARGIDUNUM. In 1941 he published 'Margidunum Excavation Report: and subsequently "Weekday Gods at Margidunum" and "Last days at Margidunum" all well worth reading. But these notable achievements are not his only claim to fame. In 1898 he travelled and explored in Turkish Armenia. The book "The Geology of Armenia", descriptive of the work was set up in type by Dr. Oswold and printed page by page by him. 104 copies only being made. In 1912 he went to Victoria Nyanza and the Kish Highlands, to collect on behalf of the British Museum specimens and to make a thorough investigation of the locality.

The Roman and British artefacts found in East Bridgford during his excavations may be seen in Nottingham Castle Museum.

Victor Kenneth Johnson 1909 - 1971

In the words of the Archdeacon - "Priest, Scholar, Teacher and Friend". The Rector was all these to us, his parishioners. An intellectual whose theology had been tempered by his mission to India where the contrast of native life with that of Western Civilization could not but bring him hard up against the fundamentals of Christian belief and practice. He eschewed the petty yet retained the common touch which would endear him to the sailors of the R.N.V.R. as it did to us. A keen historian he delighted in East Bridgford's connections with past royalty and was proud of the 1000 years of Christian worship on the site of his church. His teaching was direct, clear and refreshing. We were looking forward to hearing his lectures on comparative religion in which he was expert. He favoured church unity and was to preach at the forthcoming Harvest Festival in the Methodit Church. Fearful of the gimmick yet prepared to innovate, be it in Form of Service, decoration of the church interior, or fund raising activity, he sowed ideas liberally and quietly

nurtured them to anonymous fruition. Self effacing he was not an easy man to know, but so easy to approach. He had a puckish sense of humour and was fond of a leg-pull. We shall remember him kindly.

THE SPECIAL SERVICE ON 3rd OCTOBER

Memorials to many of the Brunts family are to be found in our Church. Samuel Brunts was the last of a line that can be traced back to Robert Brunts who died at Gunthorpe in 1558. Robert's grandson Gabriel, whose memorial tablet is on the wall near the pulpit, had estates in East Bridgford and married Isabelle Dand of Mansfield, so bringing into the family the crest that all pupils of the Brunts Grammar School, Mansfield, wear daily and sing about in their school song as "the griffin gold that flaunts on its field of green"

It was Samuel Brunts who, through his trustees, endowed the school which now bears his name. Born in 1637, he lived many years in Mansfield, but East Bridgford Church Register records that he was buried here on 2nd October 1711. No stone marks his grave.

On 3rd October at 3 p.m., boys of the Brunts Grammar School will sing appropriate music and take other parts in a special service to commemorate their founder. All are welcome and it is hoped that many will come along to take part in what promises to be an impressive and well presented service.

In a letter to Mrs. Johnson, the Headmaster (Mr.H.B. Priestley) expresses the school's appreciation of the interest which our late Rector took in the school and of all he did to keep alive and put to good use the Brunts connections.

TOWARDS CHURCH UNITY?

The national press reported on 8th September that substantial agreement on the doctrine of the Eucharist had been reached by the Anglican - Roman Catholic Commission which, having been set up by the Pope and the Archbishop of Canterbury, had been meeting at St. George's House, Windsor Castle. The exact content of the agreement is not yet disclosed because it has first to be submitted to the authorities of the two Churches, but there are hopes that an important stage has been reached on the long journey towards the unity of all Christian peoples. The Commission will now be considering the ministry of the Church.

EAST BRIDGFORD SCHOOL has started its new year and we welcome Mr. M.J.Williamson as the new Deputy Headmaster, Miss J.Williams as an Assistant, and Mrs.J.Bell as a part-time member of staff. School Harvest Festival was held on 28th September and the Headmaster and staff are grateful to parents for all the gifts.

SEQUESTRATION

Many will have seen the legalistic document which was displayed a few weeks ago in the Church porch, but what does this expression "Sequestration" mean? Briefly, whenever there is a vacancy for an incumbent in a parish, certain people (usually the Rural Dean and the Churchwardens) are given authority to receive certain money which would have been paid to the incumbent and to apply that money to its proper purposes. Among other things, they have the responsibility for getting clergy and readers to take the services, and we are grateful for all they have done in that connection.

The Patron of the living of East Bridgford is Magdalen College, Oxford. When a vacancy occurs, that College therefore has the right to put forward the name of a priest for possible appointment. Your P.C.C. took the necessary formal action to safeguard its right to be consulted before an appointment was made and it accepted the College's invitation to put forward some information and views However, if the Patron does not present anyone within 60 days, it becomes a matter for the Bishop of the Diocese - and in our case the 60 days have just about expired.

We know that the general policy of the organisation of pastoral care is being reviewed in the Diocese, and the possibility of more group ministry teams has been mentioned. Up to the present, however, no specific information has been given to the P.C.C. about how East Bridgford will be affected or about how long we are likely to have to wait before a new Rector is appointed. Naturally many rumours are circulating, but the P.C.C. is still trying to get definite news and is pressing for an early meeting with the appropriate members of the diocommeting with a view to getting some true information about the present position and the future.
