LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

My dear People,

I want to wish you every blessing in the New Year. May 1973 be a year of increasing happiness for all of us and, in any case, may we all be conscious of God's mercy and grace as the years go by. Perhaps one of the most important lessons we need to learn is to live a day at a time. Most of us are apt to be bowled over if we take life in large doses. That is why it is foolish and wearying to try to imagine what the future will be like, but most of us can cope with the present day. To begin the day with prayer and end it with prayer, and during the day to try to see the Hand of God in what happens, is a very good way of living. I have given you a beautiful Orthodox morning prayer in this issue of the News Sheet and three night prayers.

On Sunday January 21 we shall have the Confirmation here at the Parish Eucharist. I hope that all our communicants will be present to welcome these new communicants. We all need encouragement, and not least our young people. To me the preparation of these young people has been very pleasurable and I hope that what I have tried to teach them will bear fruit in the days ahead. The time of the service will be 10 a.m. by request of the Bishop of Sherwood.

January 6 is the feast of the Epiphany when we think of Jesus showing himself to the Gentiles in the form of the wise men. There will be Eucharist at 7.30 a.m. and in the evening at 8 p.m. we shall have Epiphany music by the Sitwell Players conducted by Miss Kate Baxter, with the assistance of a small orchestra. This will take place in church and there will be a collection for Christian Aid. Miss Kate Baxter is in charge of music with the Nottinghamshire Education Committee. She visited the church in

LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

My dear People,

Easter is very late this year and so Lent does not begin until the middle of March. Perhaps this will help us to keep it much better. I am so glad we have had such a mild winter on my first winter since returning from the Bahamas. It is good to see so many coming regularly to church and especially to the Eucharist, and I am glad so many were there for the day of the Confirmation on 21st January. It was a very inspiring service and we pray that those who were confirmed will be faithful to Christ for the rest of their lives. To me it was a real pleasure preparing them and after the service I was glad to have all the parents at the Rectory for refreshments and to meet the Bishop. It was the first Confirmation the Bishop of Sherwood had conducted since his operation.

I hope to start a fellowship for our young communicants and so I have invited the Revd. Fred. Green, the Vicar of Clipstone, to come and talk to our young communicants at the Rectory on Wednesday 28th February at 7.30 p.m. about the A.Y.P.A. I do hope that all our young comminicants will come to this. I have also started classes for the Confirmation at Orston church on 15th April. Any who wish to be prepared should give in their names to me as soon as possible.

Christmas passed happily with a large congregation at the Midnight Mass. We were fortunate enough to have the help of Fr. Ralph Martin S.S.M. from Kelham. The music of the Sitwell singers under the direction of Miss Baxter on the

font of the Epiphany was a sheer delight to work who braved the miserable weather. As a famult of this we gave £10 to Christian Aid.

At the Diocesan Synod the question of Marriage and Divorce was the subject of a lengthy debate. At one Mothers' Union meeting we also discussed The problems which are the subject of the Commission. Whatever be the results of these Micussions we must all be clear that a good metable Christian home is an essential thing for all our children. I hope that all Church people will keep this matter in their prayers. the Church is here to witness to Christ's tonching about the holiness of Marriage and "loo to minister to all, especially those who are in distress or unhappiness. There is no Noubt that these two things are sometimes difficult to reconcile, but there is a way in which we as Christians can witness to the standard and yet minister to those who find it difficult to live according to the standard. This in practice has meant that, while the Church cannot marry divorced people to a second partner, yet we ought to help those who have contracted a second marriage and want to build up a good home life. Such people need the peace of God in their circumstances and so it is the custom, after the matter has been referred to the Bishop, to receive Holy Communion. Some would say that this is illogical. Yes!, but life is illogical and much things as forgiveness, mercy and love are more important than logic.

May the Holy Spirit guide us in these and all present day problems to witness and to minister!

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

Jesus made it quite clear that to follow Him must be a real decision and commitment. As has been truly said, "The Christian Religion is not a philosophy but a life to be lived and a Person to be loved". It is this keeping close to Christ which should be in our minds and hearts as we begin the season of Lent on March 11.

For six weeks we shall have an opportunity of coming closer to Christ. Lent is not a time when we indulge in a lot of rules, but it is a time when we try to come closer by prayer, fasting and giving. Of course, if there is anything in our lives like alcohol or smoking which has become possessive and we are hooked on it. Lent will be a good time to make a special effort to deal with this and get it right, but the positive side is what I would stress. The deliberate attempt to take more seriously our Christian life means more time for prayer and communion and a more generous attitude leading to the use of a Lent Savings Box for the Church overseas or for the additional Curates Society. I shall be glad supply one of these to anybody who wants to give in this way. The idea may be to cut down our drinking or something which needs discipline and give the money thus saved to God. Let us try this to come closer to Christ and to each other in love during this Lent. Some people are glad of guidance about this.

For those who do not normally come to the Eucharist every Sunday, Lent would be a good time to start. Others might be ready to come to the Eucharist during the week. Beginning with Ash Wednesday there will be an Evening Eucharist on each Wednesday in Lent at 7.30 p.m. with hymns and a short talk. There will also be the Eucharist on Tuesdays and Fridays at 7.30 a.m.

Another thing which would be good would be to got a new translation of the Bible and read through one of the Gospels day by day. Another suggestion might be to visit some lonely person each week and if we have neglected our aged relatives to start with them!

we now have six girls preparing for Confirmation and first Holy Communion. They are keen and I hope that all of us are praying for their perseverance and also helping those who were confirmed on 21st January in the same way.

May God in all things be glorified.

YOUR PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL met at the Rectory on 21st February and considered various matters affecting the Parish.

The electrical wiring in the church has to be renewed and it was hoped to include improved lighting and the installation of a heat screen over the south door. Mr. stobbs submitted provisional estimates showing a total cost in excess of £1000. The Quinquennial Survey is due shortly and is almost certain to require further expenditure on the church fabric. The Council therefore decided to limit the electrical work to rewiring, installing three power points and improving the lighting in the chancel. This should cost between £500 and £600. Detailed estimates are being obtained.

The Treasurer submitted a budget for the ensuing year based on estimated income and expenditure. He pointed out that the proposed electrical work would absorb our present cash surplus. He also emphasised the great benefit of covenanted giving and hoped that people who had helped so generously to increase the church collections would consider using this method of contribution.

As mentioned elsewhere in this New Sheet, the Annual Parish Meeting will be held in the church after Evensong on Sunday 29th April and the annual revision of the Electoral Roll must be completed at least two weeks before that day. The Electoral Roll officer was asked to contact all known church people who have not registered. Registration forms can be obtained from the Rector. or the Secretary, or from inside the church.

LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

My dear People,

This month is the most important in the Church's year, containing as it does the observance of the Passion. Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ our God and Saviour. This is a testing time which makes us face up to the implications of our religion. It finds out whether we are prepared to follow Christ right through. A man might come to church on Palm Sunday and then not appear again until Easter Day. Such a man would avoid the consideration of the mighty act of Redemption which happened on the first Good Friday. Another man might turn up to Communion on Easter Day after neglecting the Worship of God for most of the year. No doubt God can sort out all this, but surely for all faithful Christians who take their religion seriously there is one place where we should be in Holy Week - and that is in spirit at the foot of the Cross. Full details of our Holy Week services are included in this News Sheet. Please read them carefully and act on them.

I suppose the least we could do would be to be at church on Palm Sunday morning and to come to the Evening Eucharist on Maundy Thursday and to pray before the Cross on Good Friday and to be at our Communion on Easter Day. As I have said, such attendance would be the least we could do, but keen and committed Christians will want to do more. The idea really is - 'Because Jesus Christ has done so much for me by way of reparation, forgiveness, freedom and joy, I ought to realise that I am in debt to Him and therefore I must try as best as I can to respond to such love and self sacrifice.

"Where the whole realm of nature mine, That were a present far too small. Love so amazing so divine Demands my soul, my life, my all." the Confirmation will be at S.Peter's on Easter my at 10.30 a.m. Please pray for those who are to be confirmed.

The Annual Meeting for the election of Churchwardens and members of the Parochial Church Council will take place on Sunday evening 29th April immediately after Evensong at 7 p.m. Please see that your name is on the Electoral Roll and then come and show your interest and be prepared to accept office and vote. If your name is not on the Electoral Holl, please contact Mr. Sainsbury or myself as moon as possible.

It has been most encouraging to see so many coming to church in Lent, especially to the Wednesday evening Eucharist. We thank God for this sign of roal keenness and devotion for Christ and His Church. I am also grateful to those who help by flowers and brass cleaning and other kinds of cleaning in church. We wish Mr. Randsley recovery from the accident which has kept him at home for the past two months. I am always glad to receive requests for prayers for those who are sick or in distress. We are the family of God and we should show that we are members of a family by our love and prayers for each other.

UP AND DOWN

Some people are mystified by what we say about Jesus in the Church. When we say that He ascended into heaven, do we mean that He went up spatially at a right angle from the earth's surface? If that is all we mean it would create a large number of unanswerable questions and would be difficult to understand in these days when we have ceased to believe (if ever we did) in a three tier universe. Yet in our ordinary speech we use phrases like "going up" without having any measurable distance in mind. A boy might"go up" to form 6 but geographically he might "go down"! Obviously we use such phrases in the sense of change of status or quality, and so when we talk about the Ascension of Jesus we mean that He withdrew from earthly and spatial existence and, after being confined to a particular location in Palestine, became universally present in the world through His Church, so that we may say that Jesus is present in the bodies of Christians throughout the world.

We may say the same of Christ's Presence in the Eucharist. When we receive the Sacrament we are made the dwelling place of Him who was born of Mary, who died on the cross and arose on Easter Day, and this indwelling is not physical but by His Spirit.

So we see that an entirely material explanation of the universe just fails to satisfy. For example, we can hardly be expected to believe that the final qualities of Beethoven are merely pieces of catgut being trailed across a wooden bridge, or that human love is just a glandular reaction. Nor can we pretend that the material doesn't matter. ArchBishop Temple once said, "The Christian Religion is the most materialist religion in the world". After all, the Son of God was born of Mary and was made flesh. The

only satisfactory explanation is that material and spiritual have a reality and in this life the way to reality is sacramental, i.e. that apiritual reality is communicated through earthly forms such as water, bread and wine, laying on of hands. These are the outward forms of the action of that great spiritual Reality who has been called God from antiquity and was mediated uniquely in Jesus Christ in the first century of our era.

LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends.

One of the most encouraging things in our rarish life lately has been the growth of attendance at the Parish Eucharist. It is quite amazing and something to thank God for. The service itself is simple and dignified and the Series 2 form is used with three hymns and a short address. It seems to combine the two necessary ingredients of Christian worship - holiness and homeliness - for while the church building is the Temple of the most high God it is also our Father's House. It is good to have so much participation by the reading of the lessons by members of the congregation. It would be a fine thing if those who worship together could also be together after the service for Christian fellowship and building up of friendship. It is here at this point that we see the need of a building like a Parish Hall or Room where this could be done. The obvious place to have such a building would be in the Rectory garden. PENTECOST

Although our holiday habits have changed and the Bank holiday is the last Monday in May, for Christians this year Sunday June 10 will be Whitsunday or Pentecost and we shall be keeping feast day in honour of the Holy Spirit, the third Person of the Blessed Trinity. Whitsunday or Pentecost is the day when we think of the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church and how a body of weak men were transformed into courageous missionaries for Christ. Especially was this the case with S. Peter our Patron, who spoke of Jesus and the Resurrection to a crowd of people in Jerusalon who must have known of his cowardice on Good Friday I am sure that the power and virtue all Christians should have in these days is COURAGE. I looked the word up in the Chambers Dictionary and found this definition - "the quality that enables men to meet danger without giving way to fear". But the word which describes the gift of the Holy Spirit is FORTITUDE or SPIRITUAL (old English Ghostly) STRENGTH. All of us who have been confirmed have this great and glorious gift and so let us use it. Boys and girls at school, men and women at work and in the home must be prepared to be courageous and follow the way of Christ without fear. Sometimes God the Holy Spirit calls a Christian boy or girl to be especially courageous and to respond to the call of God to be a priest, or a nurse, or a monk or a nun, or a missionary, but, whatever the call may be, if God calls He enables. When I was ordained priest in 1931 the Bishop wrote in the Bible he gave me "1 Thessalonians 5.24 - Faithful is he that calleth you. who also will do it" or in the Jerusalem Bible "God has called you and He will not fail you".

BISHOP URGES NEED FOR INTEGRITY IN PUBLIC LIFE

"It is vital that there should be a widespread confidence in the administration of our public affairs", the Bishop of Southwell, the Rt. Rev. Denis Wakeling, told the distinguished congregation at the third annual Judges' Service held in Southwell Minster on 19th June in commemmoration of the Queen's Birthday.

"No service was attended by Mr. Justice Ashworth and Judges T.R.Heald and A.R.M.Ellis, and civic tenders and clerks from most of the local authorities in the county. It had been arranged by the High Sheriff of Nottinghamshire, Mr. A.C. M.H.Scott, who read the lesson. The collection and in aid of the Minster overseas project to provide 1000 Bibles for Czechoslovakia.

"We are witnessing at the moment," said the mishop, "a sorry raking over in public of the shortcomings of men in prominent positions in this country and across the Atlantic. Standards of personal and political behaviour have been revealed which have shocked us. It is not that men have fallen short of the standards of integrity which we expect that causes the most dismay, but the fact that attempts have been made to cover up and hide from the public the real state of affairs that exists.

"Where there is any attempt to hide or cover things up, then lack of confidence builds up, and where people are kept in the dark they rightly cease to trust those in authority; and where there is no trust, there is no support.

"Does a man's private life matter so far as his public life is concerned? Without question, there can be no double standard, one for public and the other for private life. There must be no double vision, no moral astigmatism whereby a man can say 'It doesn't matter what sort of a man I am, provided I do no public harm'. It is not by a man's efforts but by his intrinsic character that his life develops.

"The first requirement in public life if there is to be confidence in the administration of our affairs, is that of personal integrity on the part of each of us. There must be nothing in us to hide. God knows that through the frailty of human nature all of us, even bishops, fail at times, but failure is not damaging to integrity; it is the condoning of failure, and the attempt to deny it or hide it. Individually we must be men and women of openness and integrity. Such people inspire confidence.

"The second point I want to make is posed by the question: "Whose good are we seeking? The good of ourselves and our friends, or the general good?' Confidence in public life comes from our being party but not partisan. It is where any party seeks to be partisan in its aims and actions and to use the opportunities of power to acquire benefits for itself and its own folk at the expense of the general good, that the way of evil lies. I believe that we in this country have become much more aware of the selfishness that can corrupt political life, and we long for unselfish and fair government.

"I doubt whether there is a more important issue for the new councils of this country to deal with than that of the right use of the party system in political life. If we are to have confidence in those who govern us, there must be no partisan policies.

"Confidence grows where participation by all and sundry is allowed. Government must not be remote, but involve us all. The more decisions that we can all be involved in, the less chance there is of fear building up that 'They up there' don't care about 'us down here'.

"The secret of our achieving happiness in the very complicated industrial society in which we are caught up, is that all of us must be allowed to share in the decision-making; all of us must be allowed to share responsibility; all of us indeed must be ready to share responsibility and to be trusted when we do our part.

"It is the very heart of the Christian religion that Christ lives in the lives of his followers.

The ordinary Christian exists to represent Christ In his local situation, indeed to be Christ in his local situation. That is the responsibility and the trust committed to each one of us. Confidence In the administration requires appropriate participation by all, and mutual trust which must be earned and given.

"Let us pray and work for a society which is light and not dark, where confidence replaces fear and each man in encouraged to live out his life responsibly and with integrity. In this way we follow Christ and in this way we establish his kingdom in our midst."

HOW SERIOUSLY DO WE TAKE OUR RELIGION? By a Parish Priest

When one reads missionary newspapers and other periodicals, we might get the impression that Christ's command on Ascension Day is being carried out effectively and efficiently. Nothing could be further from the truth. I suppose that in our parishes when we raise £15 for some missionary project we sit back and glow with satisfaction because we have "done our bit". A job well done. I repeat, nothing could be further from the truth. We live in a world where a population explosion is taking place.

Take India as an example. There are 570 million people living in that sub-continent, and the population is still growing. As in many other countries of the world, Christian evangelism in India is making little headway. In fact it would be nearer the mark to say that it is losing ground fast.

Where does the fault lie for all this? In the last place where we all look. In the average Christian like you and me. Until we take the teaching of our Lord seriously and practice it to the full in our own lives the work of

proclaiming Christ to the world will go by default. We need to remember a saying of Jesus in the Gospel of S. Luke, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross daily, and follow me". In our parishes and in the lives of the average churchgoer, is this command of Our Lord taken seriously? We know it isn't. Our lives are dominated by the spirit of SELF, not by the spirit of SELF-SACRIFICE. Before we ask people whether they come to church, may we ask another question - "Are they fully committed Christians? Just saying. "I am C of E" doesn't make one into a committed Christian. The Trinity many of us worship isn't Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It is EASE, LUXURY, AND AFFLUENCE. The Church of England to-day is full of people who offer a token committment to Our Lord and His Church. This is as far as it goes. The saying of Jesus I have quoted from the gospel of S.Luke is far more searching.

We all know about the people in this country and overseas who are completely dedicated in the cause of making the Gospel known. In an age of specialisation it is tempting to think of the Church's work in this way. It becomes the business of the clergy and other people we dub "fanatics". This is the greatest mistake of all. In Baptism we were all signed with the Cross which makes us messengers of the Gospel - all of us. If there are specialists, then we are all specialists. This is our vocation simply because we are Christians.

So, we want to change the world and bring Christ's power and love into the lives of millions who have never known it. This means being changed ourselves first. Only God can do that. Only God can put into us a new spirit of unselfish and sacrificial giving. Too often the Christian Faith is a plaything or a hobby which we discard when we leave school, or when something upsets us. This is where the big change must take place. This is where commitment must take the place of self-

ishness and greed. The work of conversion must begin at home in us, if it is to be taken and given to the rest of the world in obedience to Our Lord's command on Ascension Day. It will not come about simply by your priest writing a letter inthe parish magazine. It will only come about when all those who claim to be Christian reject the modern form of the Blessed Trinity, EASE, LUZURY AND AFFLUENCE, and embrace the true one -FATHER, SON AND HOLY SPIRIT. On the Day of Judgement I can imagine the Church of England professing solemnly, "We reformed our liturgy into Series 1,2 and 3, (perhaps one million and three by then) and we changed our form of church government. We used all the new translations of the Scriptures and every kind of trendy gimmick to hand." And I can hear the voice of the Lord asking. "Yes, but did you attempt to evangelise the world, as I commanded?".

THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL meeting on 13 June turned out to be a long one, as mentioned earlier in this News Sheet. Several of the items could have formed a complete Agenda in themselves.

After dealing with tree planting in the churchyard and the state of the accounts, the Council decided to make a donation towards the presentation to be made to Mr. T.E.Hyde who is retiring from his post as Secretary to the Diocesan Board of Finance in which he has served the Diocese well for 17 years. It was also decided to make a small contribution towards the expenses of the U.S.P.G. South Notts Association, and some arrangements were made for the visit of the Brunts School Choir on 29th June.

Mr. Blandy and the Rector reported on items which had been raised at the Diocesan Synod on 12 May. These items included the Order of Deaconesses, the increased use which the Church should make of local radio and other modern media, house for clergy in retirement, the repair of beneficed buildings, the three year part-time course for

Ordinands which has recently been started, the Auxiliary Ministry, and the question of whether women should become priests. The Council discussions of these matters without coming to any momentous decisions about them.

On the subject of the electric wiring in the church a decision was certainly reached. The present wiring is probably not safe and the Council agreed that re-wiring should take place quickly, that improved light fittings should be installed in the chancel, and that a heating arrangement should be provided just inside the south door to prevent cold air coming into the church. It was also agreed to fit some screening doors in the choir vestry under the tower, so as to make conditions somewhat better for the choir when robing and also to prevent the rush of cold air into the church from the western door. Tender, were accepted for these items.

Another important item for discussion was whether there should be a Church Hall to provide a focal point for church social activities, meetings, etc., a facility which is very much missed at the present time. A small group formed to give some detailed thought to this, the group being the Churchwardens, Mrs. Cornell Mr. Curtis and Mr. Reid.

Should we proceed from Series 2 to Series 3 for our Communion Services? Opinions were clearly divided on this issue, but most agreed that a fair conclusion could only be reached after having had some experience of the use of Series 3. It would therefore be helpful if the new service could be used for a few Sundays and then discussed afterwards. Accordingly it was agreed that Series 3 should be used as an experiment in the 9 a.m. services on Sundays during September.

Several items of 'Any Other Business' crowded in at the end of a long evening, but the guillotine had to be applied and proceedings brought to a late conclusion.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear People,

At the meeting of the Parochial Church Council on July 20 we had a good discussion about the possibility of a Church Hall on the Rectory site. There was a real sense of agreement on the desirability of having such a place of meeting and it would be of great value for building up the sense of family and fellow ship in our congregation. It would be useful as a place for the meetings of Mothers' Union. Sunday School, A.Y.P.A., Parochial Church Council and for the congregation to meet each other after the Parint Eucharist and on other occasions. If the parish in going to grow as is expected in population, the Church must be ready to welcome more and more people into its fellowship. It is difficult to see how this can be done without a Church Hall or Parish Room. Of course, the great question is the cost and the figure mentioned is £10,000 - a large sum but not impossible in a parish like East Bridgford. I have already had a firm promise of £1,000 as a gift for the building of the Hall. Have we got others who are prepared to give generously for such a project? I shall be grateful to receive from anybody who care. sufficiently a firm promise to make a gift for the building. Such a promise would make it possible for us to assess the possibility of going ahead. Of course, people's circumstances are all different. Some can give more, some can give less. The main thing is for us to know of the firm support of our people who are prepared to commit themselves. If you are one of these, will you please let me know privately and in confidence what you can definitely promise. Such a promise I hope will reach me before September 29. If by that time it is clear that there is sufficient enthusiasm and monetary support we shall go ahead - but not until we are sure of £10,000 !

The visit of the Brunts Grammar School A Capelle choir was delightful in every way. We entertained them to tea at the Rectory, they had a rehearsal at 6.30 and then we had the Eucharist of S.Peter's Day. The music was quite lovely and there was a good congregation. I myself value this link with the School very much and the Headmaster, Miss Gabrielle Lester and the choir are looking forward to a visit in 1074.

I enjoyed my visit to Westminster Abbey for the Bahamas Independence Service on July 10. I had the privilege of staying with the Dean at the Deanery, a delightful and historic house. The service was quite glorious and it would be impossible to describe the majesty and glory of the music, especially the trumpets which were used at various parts of the service. The Duke of Kent was there representing Her Majesty and did his part with grace and dignity. He, like most of the Royal Family, is a keen member of the Church and we are certainly blessed in having a Queen and Royal Family which give us such a lead in the things which really matter. I hear from friends in Nassau that the Prince of Wales made a great impression by his royal enthusiasm at the Independence ceremonies in the Bahamas.

We congratulate Mr. Garth Powell and his wife on their wedding and we pray that they may be truly blessed in their life together. Just a few days before the end of term, Mr. Powell received some delightful and useful gifts for his new home from the teachers and scholars at the school.

We wish Mr. Frank Smith every blessing as he begins his work as Leader of the Youth Club. He lives in Straws Lane and alredy a real transformation has taken place and there is a new spirit in the Youth Club.

You will remember that I wondered early in this year about the Baptism of children in East

Bridgford. Actually I baptised two children in July and I hope to baptise another baby in August. What an important thing baptism is! It is the beginning of our new life as children of God and members of His Church. When we are baptised we 'put on' Christ or rather God does this for us because so much of our religion is given not achieved. That is the main reason for Infant Baptism. God, so to speak, gets there first and by His Act not our own (because we are just babies) He takes us into the family of His Church. This means of course that Baptism is the beginning not the end and that in why godparents should take their duties seriously and help in every way, and not least by their example, to see that their godchild is indeed brought up to live the Christian life in the worshipping body of the Church.

I shall be glad to receive the names of any who wish to be prepared for Confirmation and Holy Communion in the near future.

On the first Sunday in the month at 10.30 we have a Family service. This is particularly useful for parents with very young children. The Sunday School children come and take a very large part in the service, but the service is particularly valuable as an introduction for young children to the worship of the Church. We are always delighted to see parents with their children at this service.

ABOUT PRAYER

A small boy was struggling up a steep hill with another little boy on his back. A passing stranger remarked, "Well, Sonny, you have got a burden to carry!" Back came the reply, "That's not a burden, that's my brother!"

What a difference love makes in human relationships! When superhuman demands are laid upon those who seem least able to bear them, they come through, buoyed up by an inner strength. Here is a quotation I like; it comes from "The Paradise of the Fathers":

'A certain old man used to say, "It is right for a man to take up the burden for those who are near him..... and, so to speak, to put his own soul in the place of that of his neighbour, and to become, if it were possible, a double man; and he must suffer and mourn with him and finally the matter must be accounted by him as if he himself had put on the actual body of his neighbour.....acquired his countenance and soul, and he must suffer for him as he would for himself. For thus it is written, We are all one body".'

Only Jesus Christ has so perfectly neighboured all the world, for through incarnation, God in Christ has acquired our countenance and soul and suffered for us and made us members of his Body.

Something of his incarnation must be mirrored in us if we are to be his disciples. To put ourselves out for others may be the most difficult thing we are ever called upon to do. It is only by God's love and grace that we can, in any real sense, put ourselves out.

The above meditation is called 'Incarnation' and it comes from a little notebook put together

by Canon Lindesay Godfrey, who for some years has written regular Prayer Leaflets for the members of the Leicester Diocesan Prayer Fellow. ship. The notebook, called "About Prayer', is a collection of 91 of these leaflets. Each of them is a little gem of distilled wisdom and they are full of thought-provoking quotations from a wide range of authors. THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear People,

I write this when quite a lot of our regular worshippers are away or going on holiday. It is the first time since I came that both Churchwardens will be away. Of course, sidesmen step into the breach, but we might reflect once in a while how much we owe to the faithfulness and devotion to the Church of Fred Hunt and Gordon Stobbs. To me personally they have been a great help and I know that we appreciate all they do for us. Michael Clarke has been accepted from the start as our Reader and I am delighted by his keenness and readiness to help.

During September we shall for a month 'try out' the new Liturgy called Series 3. I am sure we are right to do this. I know that many of you have grown to like Series 2 and it is amazing to see how well it has been accepted. This is a clear answer to those who think that we at S. Peter's are people of closed minds and hearts. But we have been asked by the Church through the Bishops and Synods to try Series 3.

What are the differences -

- (1) In Series 3 we address God as 'You', not 'The
- (2) We say the Creed in the plural not 'I believe' but 'We belive'.
- (3) There is more participation by the laity, e.g. the acclamation after the Consecration.
- (4) The Liturgy is more ecumenical in that it in akin to other liturgies which are being used in other Christian Churches.
- (5) There is a great deal more variety in regard to the observance of festivals and seasons

Each Sunday in September and on weekdays we shakl use Series 3 and then in October take stock and find out where we stand as a congregation. It ought to be realised that, at first Series 2 was regarded as a temporary form of the Eucharist in the transit from the 1662 service to Series 3.

I wrote last month about the possibility of a Church Hall or Room. I have spoken to quite a number of people and there is one impression I get and it is this - that while I think the majority of members of the Parochial Church Council are in favour of trying to build the Hall, we shall not have the support of quite a number of people whose support we should like to have. Some people think there are sufficient meeting places in the Village, some people feel that we shall be separating ourselves from the rest of the Village, but the crux of the matter is that none of the arguments takes into account two things - one is that the Church is the family of people who worship regularly in the name of Jesus and therefore may reasonably have a place to meet for social and friendly gatherings, and the other is that, as the population of East Bridgford grows as it certainly will do, we at S.Peter's are not equipped for that forward movement in our Church fellowship which will be so essential.

At present the A.Y.P.A. meet in Capt. and Mrs. Jay's loft, the Mothers' Union and the P.C.C. at the Rectory, and the Sunday School in the School. As these organisations grow in importance and influence it is desirable that they should have one place to meet which belongs to them. If we carry on as we do now, we are in danger of dissipating our energies. I think also that we ought to be quite frank and admit that the Village of East Bridgford is not a unity. It is already like a small town and is more of a

neighborhood than a community. The Women's Institute, I'm glad to say does succeed in drawing women together from parts of the Village, but that does not mean that there is no need for a strong Church life for those who, while taking part in village life, want to strengthen their Christian Fellowshi; I hope that we shall be able to express an opinion to each other openly and charitably and then come to the right decision.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear people,

There are so many things to write about this month and I think the first is the Harvest. What a wonderful summer we have had and what a great harvest we have this year! There is so much to be thankful for. We shall welcome Canon Sheeran of Edwalton to preach on Sunday night October 7 for our Harvest. In addition we shall of course have the Eucharist at 8 and 9 in the morning. I hope that many will come and that those who have lapsed lately will return to worship God.

While we thank God for the Harvest, we must not forget those who are not so fortunate, especially in India and in Ethiopia and in Mali. In these places there has been terrible hunger and starvation. There is another important matter in which Christians must help in their prayers and thoughts and that is the fact that our entry into the Common Market has meant that the sugar trade with the Caribbean Commonwealth countries is in great peril. It will be terrible if, as a result of our entering the E.E.C., many of our former colonies are left literally high and dry. There is a campaign called Europe '73 which is drawing the attention of Members of Parliament to this possibility and any who wish to sign-in should get in touch with me.

The Bishop of the Diocese has asked me to arrange the Vigil of Prayer for Racial Harmony. This is a world wide action and it takes place on October 23 - 24. In Nottingham we shall begin at 8 p.m. on Oct. 23 at S. Stephen's, Sneinton, with a Eucharist, and then there will be continual prayer and various 'happenings' culminating in a great service at 12 midnight. It sounds a bit late for us in East Bridgford,

but I hope we shall support it. Harmony between the races of the world is not only desirable but ossential if there is going to be real peace.

On October 14 we shall remember in our prayers the work of the United Society for the Propogation of the Gospel. October 18 is S.Luke's Day and this has been closely connected with the work of Medical Missions because S.Luke was the beloved physician. The main object of our prayers should be for those who suffer through malnutrition partly because the natives in some countries are carried away by flash advertisements for things like Coca-cola. The U.S.P.G., by its doctors and nurses, helps people to give their children the right food. Please read 'Nuts to You' in this News Sheet.

We are asked on October 21 to think of the Education of our children with special reference to the work of our church day schools. I saw in the Bahamas how much we in England have to be thankful for in our education compared with what is provided for in the West Indies, but we must really support teachers and scholars by our prayers and interest.

On October 28 we are asked to pray for the work of MIND - an organisation which works for those who are mentally ill. We need as Christians to take seriously this question. It has always seemed to me that mental illness is one of the greatest trials that human nature is prone to have and I believe that Jesus has a paricular message for those who suffer in this way. Much help can be given by psychiatry and we ought to pray for God's blessing on the work of Saxondale, but more and more prayer and interest is needed. There is something I would like you to read carefully in this edition of our parish News Sheet.

I am so glad the sales of the parish News Sheet

keep up so well, but we could sell more if we tried. We are very grateful to Mr. C. Wilkins who, in addition to editing the News Sheet, playmat the 9 o'clock Eucharist, and we are of course grateful to Mrs. Goddard and the choir who come so faithfully and help in the worship of the church. It was also refreshing to have Mr. David Fysh again to pay us a visit and help us with our church music.

MY!HERS! UNION

At a meeting of the Mothers' Union on September 1), the following were admitted as members -

Mrs. Lucia Mellors, Mrs. Annie Ward, Mrs. Dawn Church, Mrs. Ruth Sheldrake, Miss Sylvia Monder (Associate).

The decision of the Mothers' Union to admit to mombership divorced women who have remarried must load in time to an entirely new impression of the Union, whose constitution so long resisted this. It will be variously received by members and by Church people generally.

When members were asked last winter for their views, the great majority favoured such a proposal, and at the recent crucial meeting of the General Council the vital motion was carried by 254 votes to 61, or more than 80%.

This undoubtedly reflects the widespread disquiet felt concerning the apparent anomaly of having what had become in most parishes the main women's organisation rigidly closed against those most calculated to be in need of understanding, compassion and Christian fellowship.

By opening its ranks to all women who have been baptised and declare their support for the objects of the society, the Mothers' Union may be seen in a kinder and less critical light. It will not on the other hand continue to be the staunch bulwark of marriage permanency which has served so firmly throughout its long existence. We cannot have it both ways, and it will remain to be seen whether this change is a forward or retrigrade measure.

Full details of all the Central Council decisions will be to hand later, but it is known that by a large majority Five Objects were accepted to replace the former Three:

- 1. To uphold our Lord's teaching on the nature of marriage.
- 2. To encourage parents to bring up their children in faith and life of the Church
- 3. To maintain a world-wide fellowship of Christian women, united in prayer, worship and service.
- 4. To promote conditions in society favourable to stable homes and happy childhood.
- 5. To help those whose family life has met with adversity.

These are entirely commendable. It will also be clearly apparent that observance of the first of them must rest with the sincerity and conscience of each member rather on the automatic judgement of the Organisation.

EUROPE 173 CAMPAIGN

Christian Aid supporters and sympathisers who were among the pioneers of the great 1969 Christmas Sign-In have an apportunity this autumn to lend their weight to a new petition to M.P.'s.

The 1969 campaign secured a million signatures to a Declaration which called upon the Government for more generous and more equitable aid and trade policies. The new campaign is directed towards the European Economic Community of which Britain is now a member.

Organised by the World Development Movement - whose origin and growth was stimulated by the 1969 campaign and other initiatives by Christian Aid and the Churches - this new drive for more enlightened relationships with poor countries is called "Europe '73 Campaign".

Already representatives have lobbied the E.E.C. Commissioners in Brussels. British campaigners linking up with groups from other Common Market countries. And on the specific issue of sugar, British Members of Parliament have been involved

In pressing the case for recognising the economic dependence of Commonwealth producers on their exports to the U.K. - threatened by Britain's Common Market membership.

One of the key issues by Britain's new commitment to the E.E.C. is the intention of the Common Agricultural Policy to make the Community self-sufficient in food production by means of high tarriffs against imports.

The World Development Movement makes the point that advocates of Britain's entry into Europe claimed that as a nation we would be able to do much more to help the developing world, but already there are signs that poor countries will be lucky if they do not find themselves worse rather than better off.

Leaflets, posters and other materials are being prepared. During a special 'Third World Week' (November 25 - December 2) the Archbishop of Canterbury will preach at an ecumenical service in St. Paul's Cathedral, Barbara Ward will speak in St.Mary-le-Bow, and the drive for signatures on a special petition will be launched in over 800 places.

The petition urges freer access for good from developing countries, reform of the Common Agricultural Policy, and an increase in official aid. Signatures collected will be presented publicly to M.P.'s by their constituents.

CATHEDRALS - CHRISTIAN OR CHRISTLESS?

Cathedrals above all are symbols - symbols of what? Certainly they show the glory of God, His greatness, power and magnificence. The eternal spendour of the King of the Ages is preached in sermons in stone, shines in stained glass, is

worshipped in glorious music and solemn ceremony. In the Cathedral, the Lord Bishop, representing Church and State, authority and government, presides in his chair and blesses the established order, both ecclesiastical and secular, social and political, morals and manners and law.

And Christ? Is there any place in cathedrals for Him? Do they symbolise the suffering servant on a cross, the healer, lover and radical protester, the one unknown in the midst, despised and rejected of men, the carpenter from the working-class, the man Church and State, priest and politicial, had in the end to crush and do to death? Do these great buildings bring out all the wrong responses and prejudices in a critical, anti-authoritarian, revolutionary age?

Today, perhaps cathedrals force on us the question of God. For if God is real, Creator of the world, how shall He not be great, glorious and magnificon Lord and King, Father eternal and the Judge of the quick and the dead? The great question the Church must pose is not "What think ye of Christ?" but "Do we believe in God?" Shall Christians accept the Faith of the Creeds or be atheists who follow Jesus? If we see Jesus as a mere man and no more howsoever great, radical, revolutionary and loving a man - cathedrals have no future. Even if we do come again to accept both sides of our Faith, the majesty of the Father and the humility of the Son, cathedrals may show only half of the Gospel, however eloquently they proclaim it. The glory of the cross would still need integration in stone and ceremony, in architecture and ritual, as much as in our hearts.

When Jesus comes, shall we find Him in the cathedra' worshipping His Father?

WITS TO YOU

values to you are the almonds in your chocolate, the values on your cake, the salted peanuts in the pub, the last nobbly handful from your Christmas etocking. You feed them to the monkeys at the zoo, to the blue-tits in your garden. They are good for you - though to you they are only a tasty extratou eat them between meals; and you eat so much else that you would hardly miss them from your tiet.

In the developing countries life is short, and in some places half the children die before they are five. The high deathrate has one main cause - malnutrition. Most deaths in the third world are modically attributed to it direct; though a poor fiet also means so little resistance to disease that T.B., pneumonia, or any of the epidemic fiseases like typhoid and cholera, reap a full harvest...even measles is a great killer in some countries - malnourished children can't fight it off.

A poor diet usually means lack of protein: Mealieporridge in Africa, cassava in Guyana, a little
rice or wheat in India (worse, but not so very
different from the diet of 'bread and scrape' that
made English children rickety in the depression
years). It is in these conditions that a few nuts,
an egg, or a bit of fish, can make the whole
difference to your expectation of life.

And it is the first few years which are the most important. Feed a baby properly, and he can withstand hunger and infection in his later childhood years without permanent damage. But if he doesn't get off to a good start in his first five years, he never catches up, never reaches the full development of his body and brain, strength and onergy, which is the natural basis and prerequisite of abundant life.

The mission hospitals have for years run clinics

to treat the sick, many of whom are suffering from the effects of their bad start. Now the emphasis is moving to 'treatment' before they are sick; above all to education about diet - educating mothers especially to understand how important those nuts, eggs, milk powder, fish and meat are; to learn how to cook them best; to know and make the most of the local resources of cheap food.

You can help to make it possible in more places. The U.S.P.G. supports medical work in a dozen countries in Asia and Africa, sending doctors, nurses, medical workers, and money. As government, take over the hospital work, missionaries are from to pioneer clinics at the grass-roots where the future health of nations is being built.

Yes, the U.S.P.G. supports them - but the Society can't do it with 'peanuts' (as they put it). The U.S.P.G. needs more than that and they make an earnest appeal to us to send them more.

MIND

- less than 14% of our Health Service budget is spent on those who are mentally ill and handicapped.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear People,

November is the month of the Saints and of the faithful departed. It begins with All Saints day followed closely by All Souls and in the middle, on the 11th. Remembrance Day. How real is all this to you and me? How real are the Saints? What about the departed? Have we forgotten them? Important questions these. To many Christians the Blessed Virgin Mary is a distant relation and they will have difficulty in recognising her when they get to heaven. How real is S. Peter to the people of East Bridgford? The Saints are our brothers and sisters who have made it and are now living a life of joy and fulfilment in our Father's House. The departed who we love are alive unto God although we see them not. A good exercise in November would be to listen carefully to a good record of 'The Dream of Gerontius', words by J.H. Newman and music by Edward Elgar.

We are joined with all these Saints, and others who have died, by prayer and in the acceptable sacrifice of the Altar. I should read that lovely hymn 'And now O Father mindful of the love' to get the idea. Bodies are important, but spirit concommunicate with spirit, and when the body decays the spirit lives on in the power of the Holy Spirit. The same Jesus who was born of Mary and died on the cross and rose again is our food in Holy Communion and where He is all barriers are broken down - those in this world and those in the next.

'One family we dwell in Him, One Church below, above, Though now divided by the stream, The narrow stream of death.'

We must realise our oneness in Christ which transcends all barriers. The Book of Common Prayer uses the phase 'We bless Thy holy name for

all Thy servants departed this life in thy faith and fear, beseeching Thee to give us grace so to follow their good examples that with them we may be partakers of Thy heavenly kingdom'. I believe that this is a beautiful prayer and one which we can use for all our departed ones. The question which some people ask is 'can we communicate with the departed?' My own feeling is that there are people who do this but that it can be a dangerous thing, and in any case it seems to me that Scripture suggests that we must go to them and not try to bring them back to us. In Christ we are one and prayer is the place where this oneness operates. I shall be happy to remember at the altar the names of any departed loved ones on their anniversaries if you give them to me. In this way I can make up an Anniversary Book for the church to be used as the anniversaries come year by year.

I am very pleased to report that Stephen Backhouse is now recovered after a long and painful time following his accident. Mrs. Backhouse has asked me to express hers and the family's gratitude to all in East Bridgford parish who have helped so much by their prayers and good wishes and help in other ways. These were a great help at a time when Stephen was so ill and a great incentive to faith that he would recover. I am glad to tell you of this very deep appreciation.

Mr. Leslie Johnson has come to the conclusion, with much regret, that he cannot continue in the choir. We are grateful to Leslie for his great faithfulness. He has been in the choir for forty years. Well done!

The Harvest went happily - a good turn up at the Eucharist and a full church in the evening. The church was beautifully decorated and thanks are due to those who brought gifts and also to those who helped in the decoration and distribution.

Recently I went with a priest friend to visit

LITTLE GIDDING

Little Gidding is one of England's holy places. a tiny little place of holiness and peace tucked away in a remote corner of Huntingdonshire. In 1625 Mary Ferrar, forsaking a comfortable. wealthy and easy life in London, gathered her family together and, with her son Nicholas (a deacon - he never proceeded to the priesthood) started to live a community life in the old Manor House of Little Gidding. There were some 30 of them, dedicated to a life of tranquillity and simplicity based on the Bible and the Book of Common Prayer; but also with ample supplies of fun and games, archery and fishing for the children. Three times a day the Ferrars walked across a field from the Manor House (long since disappeared) to the church, say Matins (6 a.m.) the Litany (10.a.m.) and Evensong (4 p.m.) When they first arrived in 1625 the Church was being used as a barn, stuffed with hay from the floor to roof; and the vestry was a pig-sty. At every hour, in the House, a short service was held; and from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Nicholas led the adult family in a Vigil during which they recited the Psalms. But the Farrar's life of worship was no escape from the world. They established a school for the neighbourhood children as well as their own; (it was unheard of in those days for poor village children to be educated). They ran a little almshouse for poor widows, an infirmary for the sick of the neighbourhood; there was free milk in summer and gruel in winter. It was a kind of mini-Welfare State for the surrounding country population; it was a keeping of our Lord's commandment 'Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself'. But the Ferrars put the first and greatest commandment first: 'Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, with all thy mind, with all thy soul, and with all thy strength'. They loved, because they knew that God first loved them.

King Charles 1. the Royal Martyr who later gave his life to save the episcopal Church of England and succeeded - visited Little Gidding three times the last time as a fugitive, seeking sanctuary from Cromwell's armies. Doubtless what he saw thore typified his own dream of state welfare for his subjects, a dream which sprang from his own love of God; and which was relentlessly opposed by worldly, self-interested Puritan Parliaments.

For nearly 40 years the peace and hard-working piety of Little Gidding flowed on through the Cromwellian Rebellion, and it became a place of pilgrimage. The tiny church remains today much -as the Ferrars made it. The cedar-wood Altar in the one before which they worshipped. Now the church has the Ferrars' tombs all round it -Nicholas' altar-shaped tomb before the west door. Their prayers are built into its very stones. Little Gidding stands for Christian family life at its very best. The order at Little Gidding was the right one, based as it was on the teaching of Jesus in the Holy Gospels: Love of God, thus outward-reaching Love of Neighbour, of all men, for God's sake. You have to search for Little Gidding, hidden in its isolation; but once there. you know what the poet T.S. Eliot meant when he wrote after visiting it:

> 'You are not here to verify, Instruct yourself, or inform curiosity Or carry report. You are here to kneel Where prayer has been valid.'

WHAT'S THAT MAN FOR?

(An article by the Bishop of Liverpool, extracted from the Liverpool Diocesan News).

On St. Matthew's Day 1973, at St. Katharine's College, Liverpool, Bishop William Scott Baker celebrated the 30th anniversary of his consecration as bishop and 48 years altogether in the ordained ministry. A week later six young men were ordainpriest in Liverpool Cathedral and four were made deacon in Walton Parish Church - a "generation Gap", so it would seem, of massive dimensions. It those forty-eight years our understanding of the Church and of the role of the priesthood in it has changed almost beyond recognition, producing in some cases an acute sense of strain in the minds of the clergy and not a little bewilderment in the Church generally. It is not for nothing that the Additional Curates' Society this year has constructed its regional conferences round the theme "Confidence in Priesthood". Many of un are in danger of losing it - but only if we insint on treating the priesthood as if it were solely concerned with the needs of men and judging success by our ability in meeting them. Men's needs change, habits alter, conditions vary, and the outward role of the priesthood varies with them. But the priesthood is at least as much concerned with God as it is with men and this inner aspect of the priesthood remains unchanging and indispensible to the life of the Church. It has been the peculiar glory of the Church of England priesthood that it has taken its pastoral responsibility to our people so seriously. Perhaps it is time to recover once more the sense of our prior responsibilty to God. The priest is

a man for God before he can hope to be a man for others. To recover this emphasis would, I believe, do much to restore "confidence in priesthood". It would encourage vocations to the sacred ministry and would help to locate the priest more securely in the life of the total community.

"What's that man for?" the child once asked as the vicar walked down the aisle at the beginning of the service. That man is for God.
